John Collins, the old man who has made his home for several years with the family of Henry McGuire, northwest of Newberg, died Sunday morning and was buried Monday afternoon. The real name of the deceased was McCarthy, Collins being the name which appeared on the soldiers record of Co. H, Fourth Regiment U. S. Infantry. McCarthy was one of the forty brave men commanded by Lieutenant Phil Sheridan who followed and captured the Indians who massacred the settlers of the Cascades, for which seventeen of the ringleaders were hung on an oak tree between the upper and lower Cascades. For this service the territorial legislature extended a vote of thanks to Sheridan's little band. McCarthy was born near Cork, Ireland, July 25th, 1829. He has three brothers living at Troy, New York.
