Colcord, cashier, directors being B. C. Miles, E. H. Woodward, J. H. Douglas, Jr., S. J. Madson and J. I. Hadley.

Those dissatisfied with the action of the citizens' caucus in nominating city officials, met in a caucus of their own Wednesday night and put up L. M. Parker for mayor. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Lewis Jones as councilman from the third ward was filled by the nomination of F. H. Caldwell.

The local section men were handed out a New Years greeting from the S. P. Company in the shape of a reduction of twenty-five cents per day in their wages. They had been getting \$1.75 and rather than work for \$1.50, they quit work. As a result their places have been taken by Greeks, who by the way are said to receive \$1.60, or ten cents more than the company would have Newberg men work for. The latter, led by W. H. Hubbard, a man of long experience in section work, circulated a petition among the local businessmen, remonstrating with the company against the action taken. The paper was signed by practically all the merchants, some of whom threaten to ship all freight by the river unless the men are reinstated at former

wages. From the very liberal patronage which Newberg gives the road the opinion prevails that the company can well afford to employ a few of its citizens at living wages.

A gentleman named Hearst was in town a few days ago negotiating with C. J. Edwards towards furnishing electric power for running his light plant. Mr. Hearst, with others, is arranging to put in a big electric power plant near Oregon City on the Mollala river, and if sufficient encouragement is offered will transmit power to Newberg for running industries here. Such power would greatly simplify the fuel question.

At seven o'clock Tuesday morning two hundred reserved seats were placed on sale at the drug stores for the Fisk Jubilee entertainment. Tuesday night, and within a half hour, they were practically all sold. Ninety chairs were added and they likewise were sold in another half hour, after which benches were reserved. The seats went as was freely predicted, and those who came leisurely around for tickets later in the day looked considerably like three dimes which went through the bank robbery, when they found there was "no ile for their lamps."

Springbrook is an unusually populous little berg just at present. A crew of some sixty Greeks is stationed there, laying the track with new rails, working northward. It takes about eight bunk cars to accommodate the gang, and as for provisions, they are furnishing the neighborhood with an excellent market for meat and produce. The fellows evidently find the atmosphere uncommonly dry in this part of the country, and the foreman says Sunday was the quietest he had ever seen with them as they generally take that day in which to tea up and celebrate.
