Because I, the poor humble hearer was boxed, yes, completely boxed in by that hoodo of the present age, and nightmare of fashion, THE LATEST FASHIONABLE HAT. My strongest powers of imagination fail to furnish a sensible reason why any one holds the privilege of destroying another person's right to the enjoyment of any public gathering by interposing the impassible row of head gear in front of those behind them.

My fifty cent ticket assures me a seat to hear the Fisk Jubilee Singers but does not insure me that I can see them, for in front, rearing up above the wearer's head, "a love of a hat" obscures the whole stage. My seat in church guarantees that I may have full part in the services, but does not warrant that the minister may be seen, for exactly in front, is a creation of felt, ribbons and feathers that has the right of way. It puzzles me to know by what right or perversion of right, our every entertainment may be rendered a burden by some fair one sporting a nineteen cent toque on top of her head from six to sixteen inches higher up in the air than she owns, or why the latest pattern hat from her Parisian Modiste, entitles the wearer to occupy a space in front that by nature and every right belongs to me to see through.

the slug and snail then we might adapt ourselves to the present nuisance by rubbering our optics up to a seeing point, but as our optical make up places us on the same level with the offender in front, we feel that a straight out from the shoulder protest is called for in the interests of us poor little men.

A KICKER.

Accidentally Shot.

While the steamer City of Eugene was tied up at Lambert Slough last Saturday, Earl Geer, night watchman on the boat, started out on the river for a duck hunt. He had taken a skiff and when about one hundred feet away from the steamer he made a change in his position so as to face the bow and at the same time moved his gun that it might be ready for use. In doing this he pulled the gun directly toward himself and the hammer was caught on some part of the boat and discharged, the entire load entering the left arm in front and a few inches below the shoulder, penetrating muscle and bone and lodging under the skin on opposite side. He was brought at once to this place and taken to the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Porter, Mr. Geer being a nephew of Mrs. Porter, and placed under the care of Drs. Littleheld and Romig. It was feared an amputation of the arm would be necessary, but at this time no indications of a serious nature have arisen and strong hopes are held for speedy recovery. Mr. Geer is a young man eighteen years old and son of Joel Geer now in Alaska, and once a well known river man on the Willamette.

Mr. Geer had but recently taken the place occupied by Earl Hardwick whose tragic death from the same boat was recorded a short time ago. Earl has the sincere sympathy of our people.
