The scare headlines now being used on the front page of the Capital Journal give that paper somewhat the appearance of the horse posters displayed about the country at this season of the year.

Yamhill county will have the stuff to make an exhibit at the Lewis & Clark fair, such as will open the eyes of visitors, let them come from where they may. It will require, early, persistent and well directed effort to make such an exhibit and the call made by the McMinnville board of trade is timely.

Almost all the exchanges that come to this office speak of the interest that is being manifested by the farmers in mutual telephone lines. Lines are being built all over the country and in a few more months the whole valley will be a network of telephone wires. The farmer who don't have a phone is considered isolated and the mutual system is taking the lead in the rural districts.

It is hinted that the influence of Portland politicians will be against the renomination of Mr. Hermann. Portland manifested the same disposition toward Mr. Tongue and yet he continued to grow in favor with the people of his district. It is no discredit to a candidate for congress in the first district to have the Portland "influence" against him. The man who is "clay in the hands of the potter" gets the ears of the fellows down the river.

In the past years of Mr. Hermann's Congressional career there was no more earnest worker for Oregon's interest, and it appears he has lost none of his former activity. He is simply filling the unexpired term of Mr. Tongue, and it would seem to be only fair that he should be given another two years. To replace Mr. Hermann with a new man would not be giving him an opportunity to demonstrate his capability as a congressman and would appear unwise on the part of the people.—Dalles Chronicle.

If it is appropriations for the improvement of our rivers and harbors the people want, the records will show that Mr. Hermann was abundantly successful in his efforts along this line during his long term of service in congress.

A Washington correspondent says: What to do with superannuated clerks in Washington causes much anxiety. It is proposed that they be pensioned off at sixty from a fund raised by

those still in office. A majority do not like this idea. They prefer to spend all they can earn and all they can borrow (five per cent a month) and then have the government support them when they become senescent. They imagine that because they have worked seven hours a day for twenty or thirty years on larger salaries than any other workers on earth, and have spent it all, that they have a supreme claim upon taxpayers for support. Congress is wondrous kind and generous with them.

The Sunday opening advocates are still mourning because a rider was placed on the Lewis and Clark appropriation bill, compelling the management to close the fair on Sundays. If only this class of citizens were interested in the exposition, it would be well for congress to withhold the appropriation altogether. Fortunately, however, these persistent objectors are not in the majority in Oregon, and no doubt the authorities at Washington were fully aware of that fact when it was decided to close the doors of this great place of amusement on the Sabbath day. All honor to the noble men and women who have stood so faithfully for this sacred principle.—Milton Eagle.

When the local option measure was first brought to the attention of the leaders of the wholesale and retail liquor dealers associations of Portland they were very free to announce that they would organize and raise a large sum of money to defeat the measure but since that time they have taken their bearings and they now say that the less newspaper agitation the better for them. This simply means that they are afraid that if the good common sense of the voters is aroused the measure will be carried at the polls. A still hunt will probably be made and a barrel of money used to influence voters. The local papers go into the homes of the rural population and are read by every member of the family, and much depends on the attitude the papers throughout the state assume with reference to this question. The Lewis and Clark Woman's Club of this place will assist in organizing the exhibit, and no doubt but there are other public spirited citizens in each locality who will do much toward helping to make

Yamhill county's exhibit the best on the coast.
