Fellows who come West to get their eye teeth cut will find Portland full of men who are ready to help. If a gold brick is not wanted, putting themselves in the hands of a willing stranger to be shown around town will do just as well.

The cramming process in our public schools is not held in high esteem by our state board of health, as will be seen from a perusal of bulletin No. 2, "Hints Upon School Hygiene." If one will watch the little tots on their way to school, loaded down with so many books that they need an attendant to help carry them, the conclusion will be reached that State Superintendent Ackerman, who outlines the course, ought to be asked to read this bulletin carefully.

The longer a representative remains in congress the more he is worth to his district. The first district is represented at the present time by a man who has seen years of active service in the House and the records substantiate the statement that he has been eminently successful in his efforts in behalf of his constituents. Of course there are other good men, who, with the same experience would make good workers, but this is poor argument to use in favor of a change from an old war horse in the service. Binger Hermann is the logical candidate in this, the year 1904.

Some one has said, "The wife can make a heaven or hell on earth for the husband." The making of the latter will be necessary for a good many husbands if they get their just deserts, and the same might be said of the other side of the house in many instances. The fact is it takes two—a true husband and a true wife—to make a model home. Both must learn to bear and forbear and when either fails to adopt this course the other is usually placed at such a disadvantage that the making of a heaven is uphill business.

Much has been said about the plan of using soil from a good Alfalfa field when seeding land where this crop has never grown. The object is to introduce the bacteria which work on the Alfalfa roots. Some farmers scoff at such things, but the idea is gaining ground. The New York State Fruit Growers' agent offers the bacteria soil for sale at \$10 per ton, and there seems to be a demand for it.—Rural New Yorker.

Dr. Withycombe of the State Agricultural College said in a lecture delivered in Newberg a year or two ago, that a good stand of clover could be gotten on Oregon lands where it was almost impossible to get satisfactory results a few years previous, and his claim was that the

soil had become inoculated from the bacteria from clover roots. He recommended the same plan as indicated above. That is taking soil from a clover field and scattering it over land where clover is to be sown.

This is an opportune time for the man who "never saw such a time in all his born days." The records of the Weather Bureau at Portland show that it rained 26 of the 29 days in February, the total precipitation for that month being 11.08 inches. It rained on 17 of the first 20 days in March, the total for that time being 7.57 inches. This is 7.98 inches in excess of the average of 33 years for the two months so far. In January the rainfall was 5.22 inches, which was 1.91 below the average, for that month has held the palm over February and March for wetness until this year. The Weather Bureau begins its year with September 1, the opening of the wet season, and since that date in 1903 the rainfall to last Sunday evening has been 41.54 inches, which is 4.89 inches above the average of 33 years. The total to January 31 was below the average, but the present wet spell has more than made up the deficiency with its total of 18.65 since February 1, this being half of Portland's average for a whole year. Supposing the normal yearly rainfall to be equally divided, Portland has overdrawn its share by more than seven weeks' supply. In other words, it would take seven weeks' fine weather to make up for the excess the city has had so far since September 1.

Oregonians who have anything to do with the Southern Pacific, either in a business way or as patrons of the road will be pleased to learn that Charles H. Markham is again connected with the management. He has recently been appointed to the responsible position of general manager of the S. P. transportation department at San Francisco. For two years or more Mr. Markham was general freight and passenger agent of the Oregon lines and it will be remembered that he was the first official to put any snap into the management. He is a railroad man from start to finish and the S. P. needs more of his kind.

Vell, He Vas a Goot Smoker.

Forty tickets were sold at the station Monday morning for the down train and there were enough more passengers who held round trip tickets from Portland to make probably ten more, making in all fifty passengers, beside some of their friends, who shivered around the station on a cold, raw, damp morning, where not to exceed ten people can be housed with any degree of comfort. While these people were waiting with chattering teeth, a certain official, the one man who is responsible for the lack of decent depot accommodations was no doubt seated in his warm Portland office smoking his German pipe. If this man should die one of these days (and delays are dangerous) the Newberg patrons of the S. P. who might be called on to attend the funeral, would be placed in the embarrassing position as were the attendants at another funeral. As the story goes, in a little village there lived a "stayer," an old German, a hangeron, who was not held in high esteem, as he was never known to do anything except to walk the streets and puff at an ancient and very wheezy pipe. In fact the last breath he ever drew was through

his old pipe stem. A few of the village folk gathered at the grave as a mark of common decency, but when the remains were lowered in the tomb the silence became embarrassing, as there seemed to be no one who would venture a word of comment on the life and services of decedent.
