After many vexatious delays, congress has passed the Lewis and Clark fair bill calling for an appropriation of nearly five hundred thousand dollars. In comparison to the importance of the exhibition project, in the eyes of Oregonians, this seems rather a beggarly sum, but in place of grumbling about it, let us return thanks for small favors and redouble our efforts toward making the 1905 fair a success. With private subscriptions and different state appropriations and exhibits promised, a two million dollar show at least is assured. The fact that by making any appropriation at all, the government has given the exposition official sanction and recognition, will go far toward assisting the management in securing the co-operation of foreign countries. The thing now to do is to let the world know that there will be something doing in Oregon in 1905.

California Oil vs. Oregon Wood.

We've long heard of "water, water everywhere, and not a drop to drink, but from a conversation with a Portlander not long since the expression most in order down there would be, "wood, wood everywhere, and not a stick to burn." The gentleman in question complained that the wood dealers had combined and put the price up to four or five dollars a cord, and not a full cord at that when delivered. Considering the vast amount of wood all over the country, he thought the condition deplorable in the extreme.

Wood dealers may overreach themselves in their efforts to maintain a fancy price for fuel. A few weeks ago in Southern California oil was selling for 80 cents a barrel, it now being the staple commercial fuel in that section. That's a good way from this country, but not so far, after all, when ten cents more will buy the same barrel of oil in Portland. As a result, it is gradually being introduced.

As an example, take the steamboats. Chief Engineer Lindley of the steamer Altona was talking of the situation to the writer not many days ago, and stated that at the present time six Willamette river boats are burning oil and that within six months the majority will have substituted the new fuel, it having proved very satisfactory.

When asked as to the advantages of oil, he spoke first of the difference in price. For wood they pay anywhere from \$2.50 to \$4 per cord, a round trip costing some \$40 for fuel. They can get a five-year guarantee of oil for ninety cents per barrel. Two barrels are supposed to equal one cord of wood, which makes a cost of \$1.80 against that of, say, \$3 for wood. Steamboat men complain that the wood they get is often the poorest kind of stuff, necessitating a greater amount.

They maintain that with oil they can make two hours' time on a trip. The firing up process will be a different proposition, and no delays will be occasioned by nosing up to a bank and laying to for an hour while the deckies load wood. Several other advantages are cited, which make it altogether probable that fuel conditions on the Willamette will be revolutionized in the near future.

The Oregon City pulp mills, which burn probably one hundred and twenty-five cords of wood a day, will before long be burning oil instead, according to reports.

A few such changes will have an effect on the wood market, and perhaps 'tis well. People in general will continue to sit about the cheery wood fire, and they will be able to do it at less cost. With an abundance of good fuel on every hand, they should have the use of it at reasonable prices.
