Three carriage loads of Newberg people went up to LaFayette Tuesday to attend the funeral of C. E. Westerfield and Mrs. Ada Burt.

The sixty-first anniversary of the establishment of the provisional government of Oregon, and the fourth anniversary of the erection of the monument in memory of its founders, will be celebrated at Champog on Monday, May 2. Ex-Governor T. T. Geer will preside over the exercises, the address of the day to be delivered by Hon. Wm. Gallo-way of McMinnville.

It was a sure enough mass meeting held in the interests of local option last Friday evening. Crater's hall being crowded with people to hear good, live addresses from Dr. Randall and Dr. Lathrop of Portland. And another such meeting is announced for this (Friday) evening. I. H. Amos of Portland will be present, and it is hoped that Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougner, the eloquent new Portland divine, will come and deliver an address.

The little electrical disturbance of Tuesday afternoon took effect in the Chehalem Center neighborhood north of town. According to report lightning struck a tree on the Lars Christianson place. The young man Andrew was plowing close at hand, the shock striking him down, also one of the horses. Mrs. Christianson's aged mother, Mrs. Nelson, was also stunned and rendered unconscious for a time. This is all "very unusual" however, and the less said about it the better.

Whittier, California, people have again drawn upon Newberg for material with which to strengthen the faculty of their college, with the result that Prof. and Mrs. O. C. Albertson will go to California next year, he to take the department of science in the southern institution. The professor has made an excellent record as a capable and progressive instructor in Pacific College, as has also his wife, who has been in charge of the department of music, and Newberg will be very loth to give them up.
