Democratic congressmen are already engaged in eulogizing President McKinley. What hath a little time wrought!

Do you want to increase the value of your farm property? Get in and do some agitating on the good roads question. And mix in a little work.

The Portland Journal is worrying strangely over Hermann's campaign plan, considering that he is such a weak candidate. Another evidence of that much vaunted "chill."

Congressman Hermann has been appointed by Speaker Cannon as a member of the committee to represent the House at the opening ceremonies of the St. Louis worlds fair.

Bryan objects to Parker as a democratic presidential nominee, because he is silent on the vital issues of the day. And the word "silence" does not appear in the boy orator's lexicon. To him it is the one thing incomprehensible, unexplainable and unforgivable. It is the unpardonable sin.

Having recently taken unto himself a wife, a Eugene man has therefore declined the democratic nomination for district attorney on the ground that his duties would separate him from his newly established home. He might have enjoyed the honor of "running" without greatly endangering the peace and quietude of his hearth and home.

E. C. Bronaugh, one of the best lawyers in Portland and a prominent democrat, in a ringing speech for civic righteousness made in the city Sunday evening, declared that every father who has the welfare of his son or the honor of his daughter at heart, owes it to them to vote for local option. He made the statement that every brewer, every liquor dealer, almost every saloon keeper, every gambler and every pimp is working to accomplish its defeat. Such an array of opposition should only make more determined the supporters of the measure.

Despite the prohibitive city ordinance and the recent circuit court decision upholding it, which have at last knocked out the saloon business as such in Forest Grove, the thirsty individuals of that town have banded themselves together and are now running a sort of co-operative saloon under the name of a commercial club. The temperance mayor, Editor Hoge of the Times, is a valiant fighter however, and backed by a temperance council he is going right after the new institution. The Graphic likes his grit and wishes him the success he deserves in his good work.

The democratic editors who descend on the chill anent the nomination of Mr. Hermann receive prompt and adequate attention at the hands of the Statesman. It is after this manner: A democratic paper asserts that the nomination of Binger Hermann caused a chill. It did. This is the eighth time his nomination has caused that same

identical chill. It is congestive in its nature and always results about two months afterward in a first-class democratic funeral. Any democrat who noticed that chill would recognize it. Its symptoms are always the same, neither is their varying or shadow of turning its deadly effects.

Harmony is a fine large word. It emanates from political headquarters at campaign times with great frequency. All parties claim that the real dwelling of harmony is in their particular midst, though ordinarily there is much to be said on both sides the question. Harmony! 'Tis a sweet and graceful thought—thus ruminates a valley exchange after observing the varied political bickerings and maneuvers incident to party convention strifes of which it was more or less the storm center. Its observations uttered in a rather serio-comic mood are philosophical. It might have said further that harmony is that elusive bird which is caught by salting its tail. The harder you pursue it, the more it isn't there. Harmony is like peace—it often has to be fought for. David Harum's maxim, "Do the other fellow as he would like to do you, and do it first," has in it much of the essence of harmony after all, although its outward manifestations often fail to bear out the thought.

The tragedy enacted at Corvallis Sunday morning, in which eighteen year old Chester Keady, a boy of good family, shot, when under the influence of liquor, and possibly fatally wounded two officers attempting to arrest him, and was then himself shot dead, furnishes at once an object lesson on the results of the guzzling habit, and an argument in favor of the local option law—the nearest legislation toward prohibition now obtainable.

From now on we will hear much of that time honored "opening gun" of the presidential campaign which Oregon has the privilege of firing. Let's cram the old piece so full of republican votes this time that the report will put to flight the "unterrified" and its echoes strike terror in Missouri.

Some Cold Comfort.

With the nomination of Binger Hermann in the First district and of J. N. Williamson in the Second, the Congressional campaign in Oregon is given definite shape on the republican side. It goes without saying that both will be elected, as they ought to be. There is only a passive interest in knowing who are the candidates that go through the forms of opposing them, for the opposition will have no more show than a snowball in hades.—Bend Bulletin.
