If ten years ago just one block had been set apart somewhere in town and artistically set with maple trees, it would have been a great boon to the town by this time. Property is steadily advancing in price and the longer the project is delayed, the more expensive it will be.

Portland has decided to wake up and do some active hustling for the development of the city and state and to that end has employed Tom Richardson of New Orleans as general hustler. In his inaugural bow to Portland business men the other evening he said: "The first duty of an organization like this is to bury local pessimism. When the people of a community are of a fault-finding disposition or find too many convenient 'ifs,' they put a bar against the progress of their home city, which in many

cases dims the ardor, enthusiasm and patriotism of the more progressive citizens." This is very applicable in towns smaller than Portland.

Says the Salem Statesman: Binger Hermann should have the largest majority ever counted for a Congressional or state office in this District. He has ever proved himself a capable congressman, an able worker for Oregon, during the years he has been in Congress. He is well recognized in Washington, as a man who wants something, knows what he wants and how to get it for his state. To satisfy oneself, if any one can possibly harbor a doubt in the matter, it is easy to learn from the general and special appropriation bills of those Congresses wherein he has been a member. His services in the Congressional session just closed have also been of such value to Oregon as to overcome absolutely the idea that he has passed his day of usefulness in Washington. Mr. Hermann has ably represented Oregon in the past, is just as ably and satisfactorily representing Oregon today, and will continue to represent Oregon in Congress for the next term.

General Manager R. Koehler, of the Southern Pacific in Oregon, returned yesterday from a tour of the lines under his charge. He reports everything in good condition.—Oregonian.
