As a clincher against local option an Oregon editor harks back to the time worn assertion that if you leave liquor alone it will leave you alone. We really thought better of his mental acumen than that.

It is very evident that the Oregonian is not willing for the majority of the voters to decide by ballot whether intoxicants shall be sold in a community or not or else it has sold out its conscience to the whisky interests for a big sack of money.

The only thing the opposition can bring against Calvin Blair for county surveyor is his youth. Yes he is young, and full of the ambitious energy of dauntless young manhood. The position to which he aspires calls for the services of the capable, active young man he is.

The founders of our government were united on the proposition that all political questions should be left to a majority vote of the people. Were they right or were they wrong? The Oregonian is not willing to leave the whisky question to the good sense of the people.

J. W. Hobbs, just returned from a trip through Coos, Curry and other southern counties, reports that the vote for Binger Hermann in those counties this year will be about double what it was last year.—Eugene Register.

An Ohio citizen, hailing from Bowling Green, has started from the Cleveland City Hall for the Pacific Ocean, pushing a wheelbarrow. He does not belong to the Ohio political gang, or he'd have a pull and move toward Washington.—St. Louis Republic.

No, he doubtless is pushing his way to St. Louis to join the "push" which is raising heaven and earth to bulldoze the national democracy into accepting Willie Hearst as its standard bearer.

A resident of McMinnville says the proprietor of one of the seven saloons in the county seat told him a few days ago that the National Brewers Association had sent a sack of coin amounting to \$30,000 into Oregon to be used in the fight against the local option measure. Will you line up with the boodlers on election day or will you cast your vote to give the people in every community an opportunity to indicate by a majority vote whether a saloon shall be forced on them or not.

The wail of the boodlers is that a local option law will injure business. Newberg is retuting this statement every day, for

there is no town in the Willamette valley of the same age that can show up with anything like the growth that Newberg is making and all without the aid or consent of a saloon. A bricklayer who came down from McMinnville Tuesday to lay the foundation for Mr. Butt's new residence remarked that he was glad to get away from the county seat as there is no building being done there at this season, and yet McMinnville supports seven saloons. This talk about saloons making business is all bosh. The men who are back of the rum trade want to push in where there is an opening to make money out of the business and that is all there is in it.

The Vote of June.

President Roosevelt is unquestionably popular in Oregon. Unquestionably he will receive the largest majority ever thrown for a candidate in the state. But as an earnest of their support for him the people of Oregon ought to throw the largest possible majority in June for the party which, later in the month, will make him its formal candidate. A big majority in June will have enormous significance. Any majority in November will suffice.

Closely connected with national politics also is the election of representatives in congress. Hermann and Williamson will be elected, of course; but it is important that their majorities should go towards the highest possible high-water mark. It is the way to assure the country of the earnestness of Oregon for the party and the cause of which President Roosevelt now is the leading representative.

Not for years, if ever before, have the republicans of Oregon been so generally in harmony as they are now. Factional differences have passed away, with disappearance of the causes that produced them. The one thing necessary is to get out the full vote. Remember, therefore that this is the last week of registration.

Two years ago the republican vote for supreme judge was 49, 876, and the plurality was 17, 146. The republican vote of the state next month should not fall below 55,000, and may much exceed that figure—carrying the plurality above 20,000. The aggregate plurality for representatives in congress should be as large. These results are legitimately to be expected, on a full registration and a full vote. Such majorities are due to the country from the people of Oregon. For Oregon has been treated with great consideration by the republican party and by President Roosevelt. The opportunity of requital will be presented in June. Let us have a full vote. Oregonian.

Of all the self-confuting arguments that have been advanced against local option and one that fairly grovels with insatiate and conscienceless greed we commend, to both friend and foe of the measure, the following editorial which appeared, last week, in a paper published in an adjoining county: "Now voters of Oregon and Walla Walla county the question is put fairly and squarely before you, which will you do, vote for local option and increase your expenses by a heavy taxation or will you cast your vote the other way and be assured of less expense and more prosperity?" Not a question, then, of morality; not one of the protection of pure homelife; not one of throwing about the youth of the land all possible safeguards from temptations. Not a question of the maintenance of peaceful, quiet communities but simply the sordid, mercenary question of dol-

lars and cents. The argument, on its face, is unworthy of presentation to the intelligent and right thinking people who inhabit the rural districts of Oregon, and is of a character that can appeal only to the degenerates who inhabit the vile slums of large cities.

The situation is thus ably stated by the Milton Eagle, which might have gone a little further and refuted its contemporary even from the mercenary standpoint. Observation and experience show that local option does not mean heavier taxation and less prosperity. Argument to the contrary is a delusion and a snare to people who do not think for themselves. Every dollar saved from the saloon man's till means less expense to a county and a dollar to support some legitimate and producing industry.
