There is nothing dinkey nor inconsequential about the new Springbrook cannery which started up last Thursday. The writer was out to see it in operation Saturday afternoon and found about twenty hands busily at work getting strawberries and cherries ready for the cans and the hot steam which renders them a canned product. The plant is complete and up-to-date in every particular and is under the direct management of a practical canneryman, S. J. Lemon, the general manager being Wm. Kincaid. With plenty of fruit and a full force of hands the plant has a daily capacity of from one hundred and eighty to two hundred cases of canned goods. This, the first year, will not be a very good one from a cannery standpoint as the fruit is not expected to hold out well, but the management will endeavor to make the best of a poor season. The company has ten acres of beans planted, and if a good crop materializes this will mean a good deal of business. In a good year the enterprise will mean much not only to the fruit growers but to those in that vicinity who will be given work in the cannery throughout the canning season.

Roy Smith Drowned in Willamette River Sunday.

When in attendance at the Sunday evening service of the Friends church, Mrs. S. J. Hubbard was given a telephone message bearing the intelligence of the death at Portland by drowning of her nephew, Roy Smith. No particulars were given, but Monday's Oregonian told the story as follows:

"As a result of attempting to draw a bucket of water over the side of a moving boat, Roy Smith, a deckhand of the steamer Paloma, fell overboard and drowned in the Willamette River just below the Steel bridge about 11 o'clock yesterday morning.

"Smith, a young man of about 22 years of age, had been employed on the vessel only a couple of days, but had been warned several times not to attempt to draw up water over the side of the boat while she was in motion.

"It seems that yesterday morning while the vessel was going to her dock, the young man went to the side railing with a bucket and dropped it over. The next moment he was pulled overboard by the combined weight of the bucket and motion of the vessel, and was floundering in the water. No one on the boat knew what he was doing and all were ignorant of the accident until some people standing on the bridge raised an alarm. The vessel was stopped immediately and backed up and a boat was launched to save the young man. At the same time two or three boats put out from the shore, but before they could arrive at the spot where Smith was battling with the water, he had gone down to come up no more.

"Hugh Brady, the diver, was sent for and after several hours of hard work finally recovered the body, which was taken to the undertaking parlors of Coroner J. P. Finley."

Young Smith was the oldest son of Chas. Smith who died here a few years ago. The family returned to Missouri, Roy later coming back to Oregon.

Accompanied by undertaker Hollingsworth, S. J. Hubbard went down to Portland Monday morning, bringing the body to Newberg in the evening. An unsuccessful attempt was made to communicate with Densy Smith, uncle of the deceased, who went up to Hood River some time ago. The funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at four o'clock at the Friends church.
