The Capital Journal says it is a serious error for a preacher to arraign his town for being worse than other places. That depends. If it is worse, the preacher is a brave and patriotic man for saying so, and is some account in helping to make it better. The idea that the function of a preacher is merely to pray and look sanctimonious is very wrongly conceived, and as a usual thing is held by those who have reason to fear plain talk from the pulpit.

The Yamhill Reporter, which had no good word for local option during the campaign is "led to believe" that many who voted for the measure really prefer "orderly, licensed saloons" in the community to "joints" and "deadfalls," which might succeed them. It evidently doesn't occur to the Reporter that there is any connection between a "deadfall" and an "orderly, licensed saloon." The saloons of McMinnville and their friends may well tremble when they look forward to the week preceding the Ides of November.

The death of the Worcester, Mass., Spy, one of the oldest newspapers in the country, is something which will be genuinely regretted. It was established in 1770 by a patriotic colonist who was driven out of Boston by the English because of his fearless advocacy of the cause and interests of the American colonies; and during the 134 years of its existence it never missed an issue until Tuesday night, when the foreclosure of a comparatively small mortgage caused its suspension. The Eugene Guard remarks that popular sentiment ought to have done something to save a journal with such a record as the Spy.

While the Department of the Interior is investigating the administration of affairs at the Chemawa Indian school it is to be hoped that it will do a good job by firing both the superintendent and assistant superintendent. Aside from the fact of business irregularities, neither gentleman should be at the head of such an institution. They are not the kind of men to inspire the right kind of ideals in those who are under their charge. And whatever of manual training they receive, it has been shown conclusively that unless the

The county judge of Yamhill county refuses to give any aid in getting up a county exhibit for the Oregon state fair, because he believes the fair is on the grafting system, and that such exhibits are of no value. A man of this calibre should have never been elevated to the position of county judge by an intelligent people. The Oregon state fair is one, if not the very best, advertising medium this state has ever had and no county in the state of any agricultural pretension should go unrepresented at these annual fairs. Yamhill county boasts of her great agricultural wealth, which lies at the very threshold of the state fair, and should make one of the best exhibits in the state, and it's to be regretted that her affairs have fallen into the hands of one so narrow-minded on public affairs. —Rural Spirit.

The above rebuke is timely and well merited. Retrenchment in such a case looks a whole lot more like simon pure mossbackism than it does like economy. In fact there is no economy about it at all. In these days when the state is attracting general attention and is being pushed to the front by judicious advertising, Yamhill cannot afford to take a back seat, and the county court should be willing to assist in making a good county showing at the state fair.

A fifteen year old lad was convicted of intoxication in an Indiana town the other day. The boy pleaded with his father to be spared the ignominy of going to jail, but the father responded: "I propose to let you go to jail, and you will learn a lesson in your early life. I insist that the mayor send you to jail, as that is the place for a boy who will go and get drunk. I have no pity on you. Your Honor, I want you to send this boy to jail, and if he gets drunk again I will insist on you sending him back." The mayor passed sentence and the boy was led weeping away. And the father was no less a father though he took such a stern course. From present indications it is not without the range of possibilities that some Newberg fathers be placed ere long in the same trying position.

The consistency manifested by the Portland wholesale liquor dealers would inspire a smile in a graven image. Before election they declared that if local option carried and prohibition followed, there would be just as much liquor sold as before, and the state would be out the license revenue. Now that local option has carried they are already bewailing the fact that their business is almost as good as ruined! The second thought is their sober one.

The state election over, political interest centers in the coming national democratic convention. With the republican presidential nominee already selected, and all being in harmony in the ranks from a national standpoint, the republican convention excites little interest. But the democrats, with their several leaders, Bryan, Hill, Hearst, Gorman et al, are in a turmoil which is expected to develop into something spectacular at St. Louis.
