The district school board has arranged for the use of the upper room in the new creamery building for schoolroom purposes for the coming year, for which six dollars a month by the year, will be paid. It is the present intention of the directors to put the primary grade in the overflow quarters.

Eight taxpayers, including two directors and the clerk, responded to the call for a school meeting Monday afternoon to consider the advisability of establishing the tenth grade in the Newberg public school. Professor Kirk stated that the graduates of this year for the most part wished to pursue the work farther next year, and he thought he could arrange to take the work himself and save hiring another instructor. He stated that this is the only town in the county of any consequence which has not the tenth grade and that he thought the school should raise its standard. Director Colcord expressed the conviction that one more year's work would place the students nearer the college course, and would tend to encourage them to get a higher education. No dissenting opinion was heard, and on motion of J. A. Pike, the Board was instructed to establish the higher grade. The Board was also authorized to contract for the use of a room in town suitable for school purposes.

#### Obituary.

Mention has been previously made of the death of one of Newberg's highly respected citizens, Erastus Spaulding, who was born in the town of Milford N. H., August 14, 1832. He was the second youngest in his father's family of seven sons and two daughters and spent his childhood and youth with his parents on the farm. After working seven years as a blacksmith apprentice when a young man, he left New England and settled at Leavenworth, Kansas, where he lived until 1860 when he returned and on May 8th was married to Miss Elizabeth Kent, who as a faithful and loving companion has shared his joys and sorrows, and is left to mourn his departure. Their early married life was spent in Kansas, but in 1872 they settled in San Francisco. While in California he and Mr. Plumber invented the Plumber fruit dryer and in 1874 they came to East Portland where they manufactured and sold their invention. Selling out to his partner in 1877, Mr. Spaulding moved to Yamhill county, near Dayton, and bought a farm, which he worked until 1898, when he moved to Newberg. Four years ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he only partially recovered. His last illness, a farther complication of the first, began about a year ago. Throughout his sickness no word of complaint or impatience was uttered. On July 5, death mercifully put an end to his suffering and in the hope of eternal life he fell asleep.

A good man has gone but the influence of an honest, straightforward life will live.
