The funeral services, held Monday afternoon in the Friends church, were largely attended and were in charge of Pres. McGrew. Following the sermon, Rev. J. H. Douglas spoke feelingly of the life of service and firm conviction of the departed. The pall bearers, grown old in the service of the church like her whom they bore to the last resting place, were Martin Cook, Henry Mills, Milton Newlin, Jas. Vestal, Jas. Lewelling and M. Terrell.

Born at Plainfield, Indiana, April 25, 1838, Jane H. Jessup was married to J. Kinley Blair, in 1854, who with two sons Alpheus and Abner, with their families, survive her.
