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We read, and shudder as we read, of bloody battles in history, but are somehow unable to realize the awful carnage with which the present conflict in the Orient is fraught. Sherman's famous dictum, "War is hell," has never received more striking demonstration.

The time of the year is upon us when we see as through a glass darkly. The raging forest fires, which destroy unknown thousands of dollars worth of valuable timber annually, send forth a volume of smoke which hangs like a pall, especially over the man whose treasure is in Oregon forests into which the fire demon doth break through and ravage. For his peace of mind the fall rains cannot come too quickly.

The saloon men of the state are busy suggesting plans as to how the coming local option campaign should be carried on. Their deep solicitation that this reform movement should be conducted in just the proper manner is highly diverting. Their advice will be received with suspicion by the supporters of the new law, who in the words of a prohibition agitator who was here last month, consider their kind of local option "altogether too local and too blamed optional."

It is suggested that the Oregon Reform School be hereafter known as the Oregon Industrial School, that the bad boys may be relieved from the stigma of disgrace attached to the offending word "reform." The suggestion may be good. However, by removing as far as possible all impression of disgrace and unpleasantness in connection with the institution, there is danger of removing also from the breasts of boys whose inclinations are not wholly on the Sunday School order the wholesome fear of being "taken to Salem."

Even in this day of divorce mania, a new plea for release from the matrimonial yoke has been entered by a Kansas City woman—her husband was too good to her. Here is her statement. "My husband had no backbone. Whenever I asked for anything I always got it without question. There is no satisfaction in that kind of humdrum existence for me." The divorce was granted. The moral effect resulting from the wide publicity given to the incident will work hardship on many wives who have no cause for complaint from this standpoint.

It is difficult for citizens of a republic to realize what unbounded joy reigned throughout the Russian empire last Friday over the birth of an heir to the throne. Political conditions almost demanded the birth of a son to the royal couple, but nature which often seems to mock human desire, had persisted in presenting the Czar with daughters in place of sons, and no woman can occupy the throne of the Russias. Now the line of succession is direct. No one who has noted the expression of wistfulness and longing which has

been marked in the pictures of the Czarina, who has four times disappointed the Czar and his subjects, can fail to rejoice at the deep gladness which has at last crowned her life. For a time the clash of sabre, the rattle of musketry and the boom of artillery is forgotten. The gloom of defeated armies has been pierced by a gleam of joy and promise emanating from Alexandra Villa. "And a little child shall lead them."

While Newberg is building up so rapidly, all who have the interests of the town at heart would be glad to see some better business buildings going up, particularly on First street. Good, substantial buildings on its principal street give a town the appearance of stability which no other improvements can do. They are the tokens of a prosperous community. Newberg's business houses are as a rule very creditable, but a few more brick blocks are needed. They could easily be rented to good advantage. Wanted—a few public spirited citizens with money to invest, and who will invest it in this substantial manner.

Excursion parties will be conducted under the auspices of this organization during the fair. What could be more fitting? Mt. Hood, rearing aloft its dome of white, is a prominent feature of the scenic beauty of the state, and the opportunity of climbing a snow-capped mountain in midsummer will be one attraction absolutely unknown in connection with preceding expositions. We pronounce this the blue ribbon suggestion made to date in connection with next year's fair.

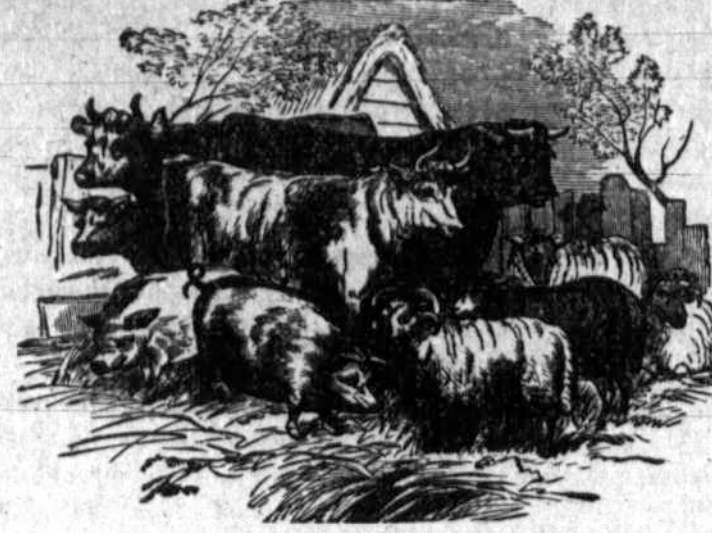
