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NEWBERG LYCEUM ASSOCIATION.

New Organization Assures Newberg of a High Grade Lecture and Entertainment Course.

A company of the younger business and professional men of Newberg met in Dr. Geo. Larkin's office rooms Saturday evening and organized "The Newberg Lyceum Association," the object of which is to establish and promote a permanent and first class lecture and entertainment course for Newberg. The members of the new association, most of whom were present at the organization, are Dr. H. A. Littlefield, C. J. Edwards, Dr. Geo. Larkin, Pres. H. E. McGrew, O. K. Edwards, Dr. R. W. Harrold, F. A. Morris, Attornies Clarence Butt and M. O. Pickett, N. J. Sykes, W. S. Parker, L. B. Ferguson, Rev. F. C. Stanard, Prof. R. W. Kirk and W. C. Woodward.

These gentleman have thus associated themselves together solely for the highest social and intellectual interests of the town. They assume full financial responsibility of a course of attractions which will cost in the neighborhood of four hundred dollars. If the course is the success they hope to make it, all profits will be kept in the association and will go toward securing even better attractions for the next year.

As something of an experiment, an initial course was tried by three young men last year, and the hearty support accorded their efforts has encouraged this permanent organization. As a college town, peopled with a high class of citizenship, Newberg demands a course as good as the best, and that it shall have, if diligent efforts on the part of the members of the new association can secure it. The hearty co-operation of all citizens is asked, that the highest success may be attained.

In the organization the following officers were elected, which constitute the executive committee: President, W. C. Woodward; secretary, Rev. F. C. Stanard; vice president and treasurer, F. A. Morris. The executive committee will arrange and have general supervision of the annual course, the president to appoint any other committees which are needed to carry on the work.

The officers are getting in touch with the lyceum bureaus of the coast and will soon have a wealth of talent, including some of the best attractions in the United States, from which to make up the course for Newberg. It will be their policy to get just as high priced talent as in their judgement the support here will justify, and Newberg people are assured of much the same entertainment as will be enjoyed in the large cities of the coast. Announcements will be made from time to time as the arrangements for the course progress.
