The number of patients which are taken from this vicinity to Portland hospitals has given rise to the question why should not Newberg have a hospital of its own. The town is rapidly attaining a size where there will be a demand for such an institution.

At present the Yamhill branch of the Southern Pacific is in pretty fair condition, but the patrons are wondering whether the road is to be properly ballasted. If not the winter rains will soon put it in much the same condition as before and much of the summer's work will necessarily be lost. It's a case of ballast and a good road bed, or no ballast and a bed which reminds one of riding in winter over a corduroy country road, the rails of which are floating in a loblolly of mud.

The trouble is rather that they are getting in the habit of allowing a few to do most of the hard work in promoting projects which are vital to the welfare of the town. In a way, the active work must be performed by a few, but it cannot be done without the encouragement and support of the many. When the next public park meeting is called by the committee in charge, let each loyal resident feel an individual responsibility in being in attendance.
