A Vigorous Kick.

A long suffering and patient constituency of the Southern Pacific railway again makes protest. For the purpose of hearing and seeing our next Vice President, an excursion was arranged that our patriotic citizens might visit the city last Saturday evening. The very lowest rate to be secured was one dollar and fifty cents for the round trip of twenty six miles with a guaranteed passenger list of fifty—with the express understanding that all above even that number should pay to the railroad and not to managers of the excursion. In other words it must be \$75 and all over or no excursion. The returns to the railroad were above \$100.

This imposition was taken with fairly good grace, but when the train started tail end foremost nearly fifteen minutes late it hustled along at six miles an hour until stopped by the regular south bound train at Springbrook for wait number two. At 6 when we should have been in Portland we were treated to the diversification of "wooding up." At 6:45 we laid over at Elk Rock for the Oswego "jerkwater" and finally, after diligent attention to business we backed into our Union depot, a tired and disgusted lot of patrons of this finicky corporation called the Great S. P.

This excursion was made up of busy, energetic, patriotic citizens of the best town in the Willamette Valley, who gave their time and patronage willingly, in and for a laudable purpose and to be cinched in price and bilked in time and endangered by a "tail end" run over a cheap road is more than we willingly will submit to again. We have always had naught but a one horse service,

not only in time tabling but in equipment, we have asked for service that we are justified in having only to be ignored, we have risked our lives for years on the rattletrap road bed and now the "worm turns again" to protest against it. We want a second service on the line, same as other divisions get for we are as good as they. We want a line ballasted and good enough that it is not a daily risk of life and limb, for our lives are as valuable to us as any one else—we want better coaches for we know good accommodations as well as others. We want a depot, better located, better arranged, that will be fit for the first class patrons that travel this line for we are as good as the best. We want better time in getting to our business for time is worth as much to us as to any one else. We want these things and more, we are entitled to them in common justice and based on our freight and passenger business and if these things are not speedily accorded us there will be other modes of transportation adopted. This is not idle talk for whatever Newberg goes after she gets and electric lines are already knocking at our doors. Now be good to us and we will be good to you Mr. Railroad. We have been, but if we start in to be mean we will be just horrid—and we shall start up horrid street pretty soon.
