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Expansion is the word about Newberg these days, and in order to keep abreast of the procession the Graphic has been enlarged to a six-column quarto.

There may be hypocrites among them, and a scoundrel or two, but as a whole these are the ones you need. You do not worry about your daughter if she builds up her social circle among these church people, and in your heart you are glad that your boy has found friends in the church, if you haven't set foot inside of a church for twenty years."

For the past several days newspaper columns have been well supplied with accounts of church troubles and dissensions, thus affording sweet morsels for comment by cynics and street corner philosophers. A church may thrive for years in things both spiritual and material and the world will be none the wiser, but the first breath savoring of scandal is wafted far and wide. In reading such it is well to remember, first, that by the time the story breaks into print the details are very probably blacker in type than in reality; and second, that the good which might be related of those connected is left unsaid.

For the indifferent voter who thinks Oregon will go republican anyway, and for the voter who is appealed to by other than purely patriotic sentiments, there is plenty of food for reflection between now and November 8th. A thirty thousand republican majority would mean for Oregon more river and harbor improvements, more internal improvements in general, more favorable legislation, than would an indifferent majority. The President has been a great friend to Oregon in furthering and guaranteeing the interests of the Lewis and Clark exposition. Will Oregon show her gratitude in a substantial manner? If so, she will stand in direct line for more favors in the future.

Some hard hearted, crusty old wretch, void of the tender sentiments of romance, gets off the following with evident relish: That was a shabby trick played on the "centrals" of Cincinnati who were suspected of flirting over the lines. A horrid mean manager laid a trap for them by calling up from different parts of the city and started the usual talk and the unsuspecting creatures, putting on their sweetest goo-goo voices, were caught to the number of fifty. Now the voices of the new centrals sound like the filing of a rusty saw and all communications are strictly business. Now, let somebody set a trap for the department store girl who allows you to stand unnoticed for ten or fifteen minutes while she finishes up her chat with one of her admirers who has dropped in to talk it over. There should be no discrimination in these delicate matters.

There is evident need of an awakening and development of taste in house building in Newberg. The standard of the dwellings now being erected here is far above that of the past, but there is room for improvement in some directions. Most of the newer residences are modern and attractive, but now and then a house is put up, roomy and substantial enough, but absolutely devoid of any semblance of style or beauty. Some people seem to

imagine that when they put up a severely plain house with a hopelessly common L, they have all that is to be desired. Such structures are good buildings but mighty poor looking homes. If it were altogether a question of finance, such criticism as this would be in poor form. But it is not. The same amount of money, with a little head work and rearranging will make all the difference in the world in the appearance of a cottage. We could mention a few houses in Newberg to illustrate the difference, but it is not necessary. The most casual observer can walk about town and see just what we mean. The style of the dwellings of a town has so much to do, not only with the appearance of the place, but with indicating the type and character of its people; that what might be termed a mere personal question becomes one of vital public import. Future home builders should do a little figuring and intelligent planning before they set the carpenters to work.
