Public School Again on the Overflow.

The children are still pouring into the public school and as a result some must be poured out again into other quarters. The enrollment is now between 400 and 425, and steadily on the increase. Miss Vauhan and Mrs. Bradley each have sixty or more pupils, some of which are using tables in the corners of the rooms. Pupils are occupying the front seats, with no desks in front of them with which to work.

Seeing that some measures must be taken to relieve the congestion, the directors looked about for another room down in town, and rented of W. R. Hardman the old Fair store room, corner of First and Main streets.

They expect to secure a supply teacher by the end of the week and hope to install the overflow of the second, third and fourth grades in their temporary quarters Monday morning.

Several residents out west of town have been endeavoring to have arrangements made where by their children can have free access to the advantages of this district. County Superintendent L. R. Alderman came down Tuesday to visit the school and look over the situation and as a result it seems very probable that some twenty-five pupils will very soon be admitted to the Newberg school, and plans made to haul them back and forth. According to Mr. Alderman this will make Newberg's public school enrollment equal, to that of McMinnville.

It is Superintendent Alderman's idea that this shall be the first step in the movement toward consolidating the districts or parts of districts in this vicinity and bringing the children
