Death of a Pioneer.

Luke McKern, a pioneer of
1851 died at his home in New-
berg on Friday at the age of
seventy-seven years. The funeral
was conducted at the home on
Sunday at ten o'clock by Elder
George C. Carl and the remains
were followed to the cemetery by
a large number of old friends and
relatives of the family. The de-
ceased was born in Orange
county, Indiana, in the year 1827
and when twenty-four years of
age he followed the tide of emi-
gration across the plains and
began life anew in the Oregon
country. On arriving in Cheha-
lem Valley he settled on a dona-
tion land claim a little more than
a mile southeast of the present
site of Newberg, which continued
to be his home up to a few years
ago when he removed with his
family to Newberg. One by one
the old pioneers are passing over
the trail to the great beyond and
here in Chehalis valley those
who yet remain can almost be
counted on the fingers of the two
hands. One of their number, an
old lady, was heard to remark
on the way from the funeral,
"Why, Mr. Jones, I felt like a
stranger to-day, for among those
present I only recognized your-
self, John Hash, William Everest
and one or two others. Ten
years more and we will all be
gone." Time is swiftly passing
and the pioneers of the future
must be recruited from the ranks
of the newcomer of to-day.
