An Unprejudiced Foreign View of the President.

The London Spectator ranks Roosevelt among the great statesmen of the race. It says of him:

Though for the most part Americans do not realize the fact, the British people are intensely proud of their American kinsfolk, and are genuinely touched at American successes, and especially at that which is the greatest of all national successes, the production of a statesman of high character, great purpose and conspicuous ability. When the British people realized what manner of man Lincoln really was—and by the British people we do not mean London society, the quidnuncs of the clubs, or the financiers of the city of London—they felt for him as after the fierce memories of the war of Independence had died down they felt for Washington. He was a man of whom the whole race could justly be proud. Though not, of course, in anything like the same degree, a similar feeling has arisen here in regard to Mr. Roosevelt. The British people feel that he is an English-speaking man of whom they have a right to feel proud, a man who is carrying on the great political tradition—a tradition which, though so often obscured both here and on the other side of the Atlantic, has never wholly died out. Though there are many things in which they may disagree about the President, many things which some of them dislike, they are agreed that he is essentially a man who stands for honest government; that he is a man who dares look his own people straight in the face and tell them the truth, though that truth may be the most unpalatable thing which he could utter.

The liquor forces are evidently making a still hunt, but look out for a flood of literature to be scattered broadcast throughout every county in Oregon when a vote is to be taken at the coming election under the new local option law. It will probably not appear until a day or two before the election but it is sure to come. Don't be fooled by any statements that may be put out by the liquor dealers. Make up your mind to vote for your home and your every interest and stay with it.

Saloons benefit no one, financially or otherwise, except the men who own them. Vote for county prohibition.

Twenty-second Annual Convention State Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Oregon.

Everything was auspicious for the convention held in the First Cumberland Presbyterian church at Portland October 18 to 21 inclusive. The church was pretty, the flowers were pretty, the delegates were—handsome and even the weather was on its good behavior. Tuesday night was welcome night and most hearty were the welcomes voiced by Rev. Nelson Allen, pastor of the convention church, Mrs. H. W. Coe, Mrs. P. J. Mann for the Woman's Club, Mrs. Lucia Addison and Miss Frances Gottshall for the W. C. T. U.

The State President, Mrs. Harford, gave her annual address, full of valuable suggestions. The music for the evening was furnished by the choir of the Cumberland Presbyterian church and was excellent.

Wednesday was devoted to reports. The corresponding secretary's report showed a membership of 1500 and 200 honoraries. This report was encouraging throughout as were the

reports for organization, prevention, education and evangelistic work.

Thursday forenoon the superintendents for social and legislative work reported. The afternoon was devoted to the county presidents, most of whom were present and spoke to the point.

Officers were elected Friday. Mrs. Harford declining to serve longer in the capacity of president, Mrs. Henrietta Brown was almost unanimously elected, but declined the office, and Mrs. Lucia A. Faxon Addison was elected with Mrs. Brown corresponding secretary, Mrs. Ida Marsters recording secretary, Mrs. Shane treasurer, Mrs. Eva Wheeler "Y" secretary and Mrs. Ida Montague Courtney L. T. L. secretary, all of whom were unanimously elected by acclamation.

Several visiting delegates were in attendance from other states, among them Mrs. Flora Henley of Indiana, sister to Mrs. Mary E. Townsend, state flower mission superintendent. Mrs. Addison of Portland displayed two fine scrap-books for the press, beside a volume of Oregon W. C. T. U. History, and was awarded the prize for the best local work, by the press superintendent. Miss Lyman, superintendent of the press work for Multnomah, sent the best county report.

The convention closed Friday night with a grand gold medal contest, presided over by Mrs. Helen C. Kirk, superintendent. Genevieve Courtney of Portland was the successful contestant.

Teachers' Institute.

The Yamhill County Teachers' Annual Institute will be held at the court house in McMinnville on November 16, 17 and 18, and also a school officers' meeting will be held at the same place on November 19, beginning at 10 o'clock a. m. The instructors at the institute will be State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, Superintendent W. G. Hartman of King county, Washington, President B. F. Mulkey of the Ashland Normal School, and President E. D. Ressler of the Monmouth Normal School. It is hoped to make this institute of great value to the teachers of this county. All are invited to both of these meetings.
