There was no rough riding for Teddy Tuesday. It was all smooth sailing.

Massachusetts went overwhelmingly for Roosevelt, but W. L. Douglas, the shoe man, whose picture is better known than that of any business man in America, was elected governor on the democratic ticket. It pays to advertise.

On hearing the first election returns, which showed conclusively the election of Roosevelt, one of the leading democrats of this end of the county remarked, "Well it's the best thing for the country." And so think many others of the untrifled.

With a fifty dollar round trip rate from Chicago, and a forty-five dollar rate from Missouri river points, the railroad companies have done the handsome thing for the 1905 fair. The rates are the lowest ever made and make possible a big exodus westward on the trail of Lewis and Clark. If our eastern friends don't come west next year we can accuse them of not wanting to see us.

The Dalles Times-Mountaineer was recently forced to suspend publication, and in his last issue the editor made this significant statement: "The friends of the paper who have given it a liberal support on credit for years past, have driven it to the wall." And every publisher knows just what he meant. This paragraph will be read by some who it will be hoped will give a little thought to the proposition. And they ought to understand without much thought either, if they try to think back to the time when they paid anything on subscription, if their memory is equal to such a stint.

Dr. Jas. Withycombe, head of the experiment station of Oregon Agricultural College, has been mentioned as a possible republican candidate for governor. If in these days of political machinations it is possible for the gubernatorial mantle to fall upon the shoulders of a man for his fitness and worth rather than for his political "availability," we would say to Dr. Withycombe, "Thou art the man." If he should be nominated there would be no danger of such a misfit as a democratic governor in a state which is republican by forty-one thousand votes. Governor Withycombe would sound well here.

The well established truth that the business man who succeeds must advertise and keep everlastingly at it, applies to the town or community which is ambitious to go to the front. The Pacific Coast towns which have enjoyed such marked development in many cases have no better advantages than many other places which are little better than stationary. The wide-awake communities are persistent advertisers. They have a few advantages and they din them into the ears of the public in season and out. Newberg is better advertised than the average Oregon town, and has more to advertise it. In fact it largely advertises itself. Great results could be attained if her citizens were a little more persistent and public spirited in advertising the place.

An observing Newberg visitor from Southern California, who was in town a few days recently, after looking about made the confident assertion that New-

berg is going to make a city—and proceeded to offer a little gratuitous advice. First of all the need of street improvement was emphasized, and there's no room for argument here. He was especially interested in the city park proposition, and declared the ideal location to be the canyon running back of the college and to the big bridge. He said no better park site could be asked, and that if the city doesn't secure it soon for that purpose, even if it can't improve it at present, it will make an irretrievable mistake. He also advised property owners in the vicinity of Newberg to be chary about cutting from their places all their fir timber. Oftentimes outsiders can see conditions from a different point of view than can those of long residence in a community, and impartial suggestions which they offer may often be received and considered with profit.

If there was need of any further demonstration of the fact that the registration law is cumbersome and superfluous in its operations in country districts, Tuesday furnished it. In cities it doubtless acts as an obstruction to colonizing voters etc, but outside of that it is little better than a nuisance. It puts voters to needless trouble to register, and on election day there is more trouble and more work to enable those to vote who have not been able to register. A Chicago voter, having presented himself at the polls with the intention of enjoying the blessed boon of suffrage, was rudely repulsed by the judges of election. "Are you an Irishman?" they asked. Whereupon he conceded he was not. "A German?" inquired they. "Alas" he cried, "I am only an American!" "In that event," they answer coldly, "you cannot vote until you have produced your naturalization papers." Change the story to read registration papers, and though it was told by Eugene Field twenty-one years ago, it is not altogether inapplicable to-day.
