The saloon men have managed to stem the tide in Yamhill county temporarily only. The deluge is coming.

With exhibit space all taken and continued application for more, the directors of the Lewis and Clark fair face a condition and not a theory. They have met the situation by arranging for the erection of another main exhibit building, larger than any yet built with one exception. Where, Oh! where are the fellows with the little hammers who said the 1905 fair would be a frost?

There is much talk about the prospects of the next legislature taking up the new local option law and pulling its claws. In fact it is spoken of as a foregone conclusion. The legislature had better proceed conservatively in the matter. The people have decided in favor of the measure and if the legislative tinkers get too presumptive the people will come back at them by virtue of the referendum. And in the meantime some political scalps will probably be gathered.

The truly patriotic, intelligent citizen is missing it, who is not following the story of "Frenzied Finance" as told by Thomas W. Lawson in Everybody's Magazine. Whatever the writer's motives may be in making the astounding revelations he does and in throwing the lime light upon the votaries of high finance and their cut-throat, nefarious "System," he is certainly telling some awful facts with which the American people should become cognizant. While the story must have a more or less disheartening effect upon the reader, it is better that the truth be known. A knowledge of existing conditions must precede adequate remedial measures on the part of the people.

The growler in the Oregonian Tower has one sane moment on the local option issue when he suggests that much of the furor of agitation against the saloon and its influences has been raised and fomented by the high handed way in which the saloon and gambling elements have over-riden all laws at pleasure or in the words of the Oregonian, "by their indecency and lawlessness." This is correct. But the writer goes on to suggest that the lesson will not be disregarded by the toughs. This is where he is wrong. The good people are up in arms against the saloons, not only because of the recent affront, not only because of the manifestation of "indecency and lawlessness," but because they

realize that these are the eternal qualities and elements of the guzzling shops and gambling dens. It is not in the nature of the saloon man or gambler to be other than indecent and lawless and the effrontery exhibited is a matter of degree only. Clearly realizing all this, self-respecting and law-abiding people are in the fight to stay.

Laid at Rest.

After an illness of a few weeks, Mrs. Gertrude McPoland, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Craven, and wife of James McPoland, died at Middleton last Saturday evening of tubercular meningitis. Born near Mooresville, Indiana, not quite twenty-seven years ago, she was in the bloom of young womanhood, and her death leaves parents and husband bereft of all they held most dear in life—leaves two homes in which the light has failed.

Very beautiful and impressive funeral services were held at the home Monday at ten o'clock, conducted by Rev. Herbert Cash, pastor of the Friends church of this place, and formerly pastor at Middleton where he was in close touch with the deceased, a birthright member of the church. He spoke earnestly of the cheerful, helpful life which had gone out, voicing a bright hope and steadfast faith that the safe harbor of eternal rest had been entered. The funeral was very largely attended, the whole neighborhood seemingly being in attendance.

Following the services, relatives and friends started with the body for Newberg, arriving at the cemetery here at one o'clock, where after a short service by the pastor, assisted by Mrs. Jesse Edwards, interment was made. The floral offerings with which the grave was decorated were certainly the most profuse and beautiful ever seen here. Friends seemed to vie with each other in testifying through the silent, but beautifully eloquent flowers, to the esteem and friendship in which they held her whom they had known so well.

Ellen Hanson, eldest daughter of John and Sarah Hanson, was born August 27, 1846 in Wayne county, Indiana, where at the age of 16 years she was married to C. W. Patty. To this union were born two children, Arthur and Evangeline. She was afterwards married to I. H. Robbins, to whom were born three children, Sherman, John and Alice.
