The Oregonian is taking up much valuable space in trying to convince the people of Oregon that the local option law which was passed on by the voters at the June election, and which was adopted by a good majority is not what they want. Since the big daily has never ranked very high as a temperance organ the people will hardly regard it as strictly orthodox on the question of local option.

"We will be found using our influence to bury them so deeply the next time the question is voted on, that there will be no grounds for a contest." Thus speaks up the North Yamhill Record in paying its respects to the saloon men anent their evading on technicalities the expressed will of the majority. The Graphic is anxious for the Newberg city council to construct a fire district, and permit nothing but brick buildings to be built within the business portion of the city. It's up to the citizens of Newberg to begin active preparations toward making an adequate Newberg exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Centennial. It is useless to think further of a county exhibit, but because Yamhill county is too conservative—we are charitable in the use of the adjective here—to advertise its resources and attractions, there is no reason why the people of this community should not go resolutely to work and make an exhibit worthy of the thriving, enterprising section of Yamhill. Indeed there is all the more reason

for thus bestirring ourselves. We have the natural attractions and the industries, and what's more we have the energy and push to exploit them. With a reasonable amount of money judiciously expended, a very creditable and profitable Newberg display can be arranged. Let's get to work. Let's acquit ourselves like self-respecting citizens.

Both the McMinnville papers are apparently well satisfied with the decision of the county court in which the will of the majority respecting the licensing of saloons was set aside. At least they have nothing to say in opposition to it and one of them intimates that if the saloon keepers will be good boys in the future the "majority" of the voters will favor letting them continue in business, and the other publishes a flaming, double column advertisement of one of the county seat whisky shops.

Think of it! A national exposition to open soon at our own doors, right at home in fact, and not one move has been made toward an exhibit for Old Yamhill, one of Oregon's best known counties. It's a disgrace and an outrage. It was certainly an unhappy turn of the wheel which put the county court in the hands of mossbacks just at a time when enterprise and public spirit are called for. The time worn economy croak is a pitiable manifestation of niggardliness and folly in such a case. Miserliness, not economy, is the word. The great need of Oregon is more people and more capital. We've all been endeavoring to get attention fixed upon the state. The 1905 fair is proving a great advertiser, exceptionally low rates have been made and the people are preparing to come and see us and ours. And after all the agitation, it seems that this county is not going to turn a hand to let the visitors at the exposition know that Yamhill is on the map. In other words the feast is set before us but we will not exert ourselves to reach for our share of the good things. We will be economical, and rather than waste our substance we will go without eating. Nay, do not smile, for this is the definition of economy as made by Yamhill's county court, and by some tight fisted old usury gatherers who doubtless support it. Are we ready to employ the undertaker?

The "Silent Places" of Oregon.

The great "Silent places" of Oregon, and of the West, are in the trackless woods of the Upper Rogue Sugar Pine Reserve. This is the largest forest of sugar pine in the world. Its giant trees are excelled only by the famous redwoods of California. The reserve embraces over 250 square miles of Crater Lake National Park. As the whole is under the protecting care of rangers and park patrolmen, the 500 square miles of the two are practically one vast park. There are many trees in this reserve that are from 25 to 34 feet about base of trunk. There are many trees larger than this in the Northwest; but they are not sugar pines. It is murder to cut a tree in this reserve. Men make their campfires of broken boughs and fallen wood, of which there is plenty. Uncle Sam has a guarding hand over the "Silent places," and he who builds a campfire there must leave no smoldering embers. In this reserve, and by Rogue River Gorge is Mills Falls, the fall of Mills Creek over the canyon wall into the Rogue. It is a sheer fall of 186 feet.—From The Pacific Monthly for December.
