The published report of the State Board of Health names but some half dozen cities and towns in Oregon which have water supplies ranked as belonging to the first class. It is a cause for pride on the part of the citizens of this community that Newberg appears in the list. It is an excellent advertisement.

With an apologetic air the county court says it has been contemplating setting a day for considering the question of a county exhibit at the 1905 fair, so that citizens may appear and make known their wishes in the matter. How would June 1, 1905, do for such a date? We wouldn't want the court to be too hasty in the matter.

The Board of Trade struck the proper keynote Monday evening. Newberg will be in evidence at the Lewis and Clark Centennial, whether Yamhill county makes an exhibit or not. Like Oregon, "she flies with her own wings," and with concerted, enthusiastic action among ourselves, we will not be made ashamed before our friends next year. On to the 1905 fair!

City election draweth on apace. The coming year will be an important one in the history of Newberg and the men into whose hands will be intrusted the business welfare of the city should be chosen carefully. The capable, busy man is the desirable one for councilman, but too often the services of such a man cannot be had. A little personal sacrifice for the public good is demanded. The best men are none too good to sit on the council.

Despite the objections such as are made against every progressive movement, the establishment of a fire limit by the city council within which no wooden buildings can be erected, is demanded. Until such is done Newberg will remain more or less in the village state. For the good of the town such a limit should have been established long ago. Too many frame buildings have gone up on First street. There was a demand for them it is true, but in many cases they have hindered the erection of substantial brick structures. In behalf of a greater Newberg a change must be made.

College Song Chosen in Competition.

Soon after college opened in the fall agitation was begun toward securing an official song, composed by some member of the student body. To that end competition was declared open and the students invited to offer contributions. A dozen or more responded and the "offerings" have been judged by the faculty, assisted by two members of the alumni.

The decision was a close one,

and finally two poems, composed by Cecil Hoskins and Ray Pemberton, were combined, and thus arranged, will constitute the words of the college song. Ernest Bales was a dangerous rival of the successful contestants.

Lewis and Clark Centennial Notes.

Almost every county in the state of Oregon will have an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Centennial.

Almost every nation that rises to the dignity of a place on the map will be represented at the 1905 fair.

Photographs of several hundred school buildings will form an interesting feature of Oregon's educational exhibit at the Centennial.

Idaho fruit growers will prepare an apple exhibit which promises to rival those of Oregon and California.

The Legislature of the state of Washington will be asked to appropriate \$75,000 for the erection of a state building and the collection of a suitable exhibit.

The building which will house Russia's exhibit of paintings by modern Russian artists will be a replica of an old Moscow palace used by the Romanoff kings of the early times.

Native villages will be a feature of the Philippine display, and they will embrace a more comprehensive showing of the manner and customs of the wild tribes of the Islands than did those of St. Louis.

Prof. R. F. Robinson, superintendent of the Portland public schools, has been chosen superintendent of Oregon's educational exhibit in place of Prof. H. S. Lyman who resigned on account of ill health.

The art display will be of fabulous value, representing more money than will be spent in producing the entire Exposition. There will be not a few paintings worth on the market at least \$100,000 each, and the aggregate value of the display will amount to millions of dollars.

Far away Persia will send to the Lewis and Clark Centennial an elaborate display of Oriental art. This display, which will be a notable one in Exposition history, will include a valuable collection of rugs, paintings, potteries and tapestries, the display being made officially by the Persian Government.
