It is surprising to note the number of candidates for speaker of the house and president of the senate, respectively, who already have enough votes in sight to elect them, when each chair will hold one man only.

A Milton butcher advertises his shop as a "One Horse Meat Market," which leaves the public to infer that his capital is limited and he can't get enough ahead to buy and butcher more than one cayuse at a time.

If Portland really wants a decent city next year during the Lewis and Clark fair the best thing that can be done will be to place Tom Word at the head of the police department and say, "Mr. Word we want you to see that the law is enforced," and then let him alone.

This is a good time in the year to hold a good roads meeting. In a multitude of counselors there is safety and an exchange of ideas on road making would awaken a fresh interest. Why not hold one in Newberg soon after the meeting of the poultry breeders?

The program arranged for the annual meeting of the state horticultural society, which will be held in Portland, January 10 and 11, is a good one and no one who is at all interested in fruit growing, even though it may be in a small way, can afford to stay away from these meetings.

The West Side Enterprise says: "Cut politics out and organize the legislature on a business basis for the benefit of the people, once." What a grunt this would bring from the Salem hog when he would think of the loss such a course would entail on the boarding house people, owing to the absence of the biennial political grafters.

The feasibility of establishing a camping ground on the hills back of the Lewis and Clark fair grounds is being considered and a plot of two acres has been mentioned. The scheme is a good one and it ought to be carried out by all means, for there are hundreds of families all over the country who will want to attend the fair a number of days who are not financially able to pay hotel bills, and then the annual outing habit has become so fixed on many of our people that they thoroughly enjoy it, and if grounds are arranged making yearly pilgrimages to the sea shore will cut this out next season and go into camp at the fair grounds instead. The managers of the fair will find however that a two acre

plot will be entirely too small to accommodate the crowd, for many will go with teams and room must be made for horses as well as for tents for camping.

There seems to be something doing over at Hillsboro since the new mayor took the reins. His first act was to fire the superintendent of the light plant, then, as the Independent says: The mayor deferred appointing a marshal until the next regular meeting, but gave it out flat-footed that the next man to wear the star for this city would have to earn his salary. He would only be hired from month to month, declared the mayor, and if he failed to attend to business and help build cross-walks and do other jobs a marshal is supposed to hate like poison, there would be another scalplock hanging to his honor's belt in short order, and another added every month it needs be.

Superintendent Looney of the State Reform School in his biennial report urges the legislature to pass a stronger measure prohibiting the sale of cigarettes, saying: "The cigarette has more victims than the saloons. It gets fast hold on the young before reason and judgement have developed, and insiduously saps intelligence and vitality before the parent realizes it; when the boy reaches manhood he has become an irresponsible cigarette fiend." The recommendation is a good one and ought to be acted on, but the small boy who will, perchance, peep in at the Willamette hotel of evenings during the session of the legislature, and witness the volumes of smoke issuing from the mouths of the lawmakers, will no doubt wonder why the little chaps should be denied the privilege of polluting God's pure air all the same as the great lawmakers, and then when he calls to mind the fact that in his home precinct during the political campaign, the candidate who always advised the little boys to abstain from the use of the weed, passed along the street handing out cigars for the purpose of influencing voters, he will no doubt call to mind the old but truthful saying that "example is better than precept."
