



YAMHILL RALLIES.

A Mass Meeting of County's Progressive Citizens Held at McMinnville—Lewis and Clark Fair Boomed.

A big mass meeting was held at McMinnville yesterday which started the ball rolling, and it looks now like Yamhill county might be fairly well represented at the Lewis and Clark fair. On very short notice the McMinnville Development League called a meeting for January 4th, and an excursion train was asked for over the Yamhill branch of the S. P. This train picked up passengers at Springbrook, Newberg, Dundee, Dayton and Whiteson, the number going from Newberg being more than thirty.

The excursionists were met at the station by a delegation of McMinnville citizens who led the way to Burns hall, where the meeting was called to order by Chas. Grissen. Jesse Edwards of Newberg was elected chairman, and R. L. Harris of Dayton assistant secretary, J. C. Cooper being the permanent secretary of the league.

D. A. Snyder, chairman of the county board of exhibit which was appointed by the county court a year ago, was called on for a statement of the work accomplished by the board. Mr. Snyder stated that the work of the board had been hampered by the lack of funds as no appropriation had been made for carrying on the work, and that everything so far had been accomplished by personal effort and small private donations. A small collection of fruits, grains etc. has been made at a cost of \$250.

Tom Richardson, secretary of the Oregon Development League, responded to a call for a speech and entertained the audience until the dinner hour. Tom is the whole team, including the wagon and harness and he is never so much at home as when he is standing before an audience telling of the beauties of Oregon and how to advertise the state among the people who are on the move and are wanting information. He spoke again in the afternoon and being a man of wide experience he easily held the attention of the audience. W. E. Coman of the Southern Pacific also spoke in the afternoon and assured the audience that the S. P. people were arranging to furnish ample accommodations for carrying the people to and from the fair next year. He also stated that next year his company will carry household goods from Eastern points to Oregon for intending settlers at just one-half the regular rate.

The most telling speech of the day was made by Hon. Chas. V. Galloway who had charge of the horticultural exhibit at the St. Louis fair. He told of his experiences at the fair and said the people were looking toward the great Northwest for settlement, and Yamhill county, the banner county of Oregon, could not afford to fail to make a showing at the Lewis and Clark fair. He said however that at these great expositions the throngs of people look at exhibits by way of comparisons and unless we make an excellent showing we had better make none at all.

Toward the close of the meeting the matter of a county apportionment was discussed and a resolution was adopted, with only one dissenting vote, asking the county court to appropriate \$1000 for the purpose of aiding in an exhibit, and as the court was then in session a committee

of ten taxpayers was appointed to go at once and lay the matter before that body. If the appropriation is made the Lewis and Clark State Commission will then give \$500 for the same purpose, and a fairly good sized nest egg will have been laid, which, if added to by private subscription in a liberal way will put the county board in a position to make a creditable showing at the fair. By resolution it was recommended that the mayors of the different towns of the county and the presidents of the boards of trade be added to the county board of exhibits. Withall it was a full day's work and one that will result in much good to the county.

Rev. R. Pettyjohn Convicted on Charge of Trespass

The trouble which has been brewing of late among the Free Methodists came to a head yesterday when Rev. R. Pettyjohn was tried before a jury in Recorder Pickett's court on a charge of trespass, preferred by Rev. H. Bowman, pastor of the church.

A few weeks ago Rev. Bowman began a series of revival meetings, and when he thought they had continued long enough, announced their close. Rev. Pettyjohn persisted in continuing the services, whereupon the pastor put a lock on the door and ordered him to keep out. Disregarding the command, he climbed in at a window, unlocked the door and has since been holding services.

Rev. Bowman conferred with Bishop Coffee of this district, with the result that the aforementioned action was taken. Bishop Coffee was present at the trial yesterday and managed the prosecution. Rev. Pettyjohn had no legal assistance, but after asking at the opening of the trial for a few minutes' conference with his counsel, knelt in vocal prayer for vindication, presenting rather an uncommon spectacle for a court room. It is suspected that if such counsel had been properly taken beforehand, the trouble might have been averted.

It was shown in the trial that the guardianship of the church property is vested in the pastor, according to the discipline of the Free Methodist church, whereupon the jury, C. P. Carey, J. W. Douglas, Jacob Holdeman, R. J. Cooper, J. R. Smith, and J. W. Childs, found the defendant guilty as charged. On the promise of Rev. Pettyjohn not to repeat the offense, Recorder Pickett gave him the minimum penalty—a fine of five dollars and costs.

It is the general opinion that the defendant erred from an overzealousness rather than from any willful intention.
