Bragged Too Soon.

Asks the Newberg Graphic: "Why doesn't The Oregonian charge up the filthy condition of the streets of Portland to the passage of the local option law?" The streets of Portland are not filthy. The most cleanly and decent streets in Oregon are those of Portland. If your occasions call you to Newberg, just be prepared to avert your eyes and to hold your nose.

Again the Graphic has drawn the Oregonian's fire, as witness the above which appeared as an editorial in Saturday's paper. Braggadocio and insinuation are such common weapons of defense on the part of the big daily, and so well recognized as such, that the above would ordinarily be passed by with contempt. In this case however, the Oregonian's bluff is so easily and effectually called that we cannot forbear performing this little office.

"The streets of Portland are not filthy but are the most cleanly and decent in Oregon," proudly asserts the Oregonian on Saturday. On Monday a Portland evening daily comes out with a long article with such glaring headlines as these: "These Streets are Impassable," "Business Men Have to Build Their Own Roads," "Conditions Make Conduct of Commercial Enterprises Disagreeable," "Impassable for Fire Engines." Here are the first few sentences of the article:

"Among people who are engaged in business on First street, Front street, Water street and at the foot of cross streets ending at the river front, there is deep-seated dissatisfaction over the filthy condition caused by wet weather, defective paving and general lack of attention. These streets are not a 'slum' district. They are lined on both sides by business houses, and they carry the traffic for an extensive section that is rapidly filling with important industries along the river front. Business men in this district say no other city in the country would tolerate conditions as they now exist there."

Now this is not outside accusation. It comes from the Portland press. It is certainly not with the intention of defaming Portland that the Graphic calls attention to some of that city's vile streets but with the hope that the Oregonian man may open his eyes, which seem to be "averted," and let go his nose which he seems to be holding, and get wise before making such vain and idle boasts as the above.

And don't worry about Newberg. Her streets will bear improvement for which preparations are being made, and we don't claim them to be "the most decent in Oregon." However none of them are yet "impassable," and her citizens are able to get about town dry-shod to a degree which would be at once a relief and a revelation to residents of certain districts of

farmers and of the attitude of city people toward them. Twenty-four years ago he heard a Portland business man say to another as a farmer passed, "There goes a — chump." A little later it was the custom to call farmers "hay seeds." "But now," says Mr. Schulmerich, and truthfully, "the farmer who is worthy of respect gets it."

The long-looked-for, the much discussed, the widely heralded 1905 is with us at last—and yet how many have been guilty of writing it 1904!
