A "Royal" Cherry Tree.

We mentioned last summer a remarkably fruitful cherry tree which is on a farm near Newberg, Oregon. Mr. Porter Skinner, of Springbrook, Oregon, visited the tree last summer and investigated its history. It is a Royal Ann and is on the Abernethy place at the foot of Parrott Mountain about two miles from Newberg. This tree was planted about fifty years ago. It was probably propagated at the old Lewelling nursery from a scion cut from the one Royal Ann cherry tree which came across the plains in Henderson Lueling's traveling nursery in 1845. The tree measures twelve feet in circumference five feet above the ground. It has not

failed to bear a crop for many years. This year was a year of very light yield for nearly all Royal Ann cherry trees, but from this one tree 1600 pounds of marketable cherries were sold to the Springbrook cannery. There have been years when the crop exceeded a ton. The location of this tree and the soil in which it stands are probably leading factors in its persistent and heavy bearing. There may be something of special merit in this particular tree itself and if so is a good tree to obtain scions from.—Agriculturist.

Beveridge a Convert to Osteopathy.
