The bill introduced in the legislature amending the new local option law amounts practically to a repeal measure, for if it passes the law will be of little or no force. It is believed that the liquor interests in their unholy zeal have gone too far for their own good.

The county court having come to the front with an appropriation of one thousand dollars, with the five hundred dollars from the state commission, we have a fair start for a creditable Yamhill exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Centennial. Let the good work be furthered by liberal private subscriptions and enthusiastic effort on the part of all.

Oregon osteopaths will ask recognition at the hands of the state legislature. Like members of any other honorable and well established profession, they deserve the power to protect themselves from pretenders and frauds. The American spirit of fair play should always call for a square deal. So much is said without any pros and cons as to the merits of osteopathy.

In setting a day for a county good roads meeting, as suggested by the Graphic recently, the county court is to be commended. Good roads are imperative to the proper development of a country and without organization and system we will never have them. The call of the meeting is for January 31st, and an invitation is extended to all road supervisors of the county and all others interested to attend.

Ament the convening of the state legislature, likewise of the state normal school lobbyists, many papers are crying out against the reckless and needless expenditure that is called for to support five state normals. It is a little late to begin a campaign against such a policy, but the sooner the better. For years the Graphic has stood strongly against the poly-normal idea and is pleased to see others "taking notice." The practice of legislative back scratching is largely responsible for the existing state of affairs and reform measures will call for some hard and persistent work.

**The Pacific Coast.**

The Pacific Coast is coming to its own. The talisman that is producing this consummation so devoutly to be wished is the splendid Exposition that is to be held in Portland this year. The Coast is just beginning to awaken to a realization of the great opportunity that is being presented to it. It now remains for Washington and other states to get into line in the proper manner. This Exposition, while held in Portland, is going to be a tremendous factor in the upbuilding of the Pacific Coast. The eyes of the world are being turned toward us, and it behooves every one of us to do his duty toward his state and toward this Coast. Let us cement the people of this great Western region into a unified body, bent upon the upbuilding of our unparalleled land and the exploitation of our marvelous resources and advantages. We need people. We need nothing else. We have it all. No other people in the world are so fortunate as we. Let us tell the world what we have; but let us go forward in an unbroken phalanx to triumph and a permanent and increasing prosperity.—From the Pacific Monthly for January.
