The above is a fair sample of how Brother Hofer can beg the question at times and then wobble in his logic. In the first place the cry is not, "down with all the state normals." What the public objects to is the fact that country high schools here and there over the state have been dubbed "state normals" and given support from the state treasury. In the first place it is unjust to the public which puts

up for the graft, and in the second such a division of support lessens the efficiency of normal work. It is because the people do want a good state normal that they are objecting so strenuously to the two by four so-called normal schools which have been foisted onto the state.

The short contributed article in this issue upon the subject of walnut tree planting is certainly timely. When the fruit growing boom came on here several years ago, bringing a great demand for trees, growers bought nursery stock hastily and in many cases a few years showed that previous mistakes had been made. Let those who contemplate walnut culture profit thereby.

In another column of this issue appears a report of a visit to Newberg by Tom Richardson, Secretary of the Portland Commercial Club. The Advance invites all to read this report and imagine how it would sound if it came from Amity instead of Newberg. Amity has every opportunity present at Newberg, but it appears the people there have made a little better use of such opportunities. Though the fate of a few of Oregon's pseudo state normals for a while seemed to hang in the balance, the normal lobbyists rallied their cohorts, joined forces for protection, and managed to stay the legislative ax, appropriations for all the schools being secured. Representative Caldwell of this place started the good fight by fathering a bill which would have eliminated the Drain so-called normal. Both of Yamhill's representatives waged a good fight for the measure, which was finally defeated. But the victory of the Oregon state normal trust is merely temporary. Never before has there been such a fight waged against it and we believe that the outcome will be consolidation and one real state normal. As a matter of fact Oregon has no school at present worthy such a name.

In one of the Lewis and Clark Centennial notes found in this issue, the statement is made that Sacramento, California, will exhibit a section of the "biggest cherry tree on the Pacific Coast," the tree measuring three feet in diameter. If the Abernethy boys out southeast of town cared to cut down their historic cherry tree, which though fifty years old, is still doing business at the rate of nearly a ton of fruit a year, they could exhibit a section at the fair which would easily disprove the claims made for the California tree. A statement was published in the Graphic a few weeks ago from Porter Skinner, to the effect that he found by measurement that the Abernethy tree was twelve feet in circumference as high as five feet from the ground, which would give it a foot more diameter than that of the Sacramento tree. Oregon will yield nothing to California on any proposition which has to do with cherries.
