



Lewis and Clark Centennial Notes.

California's Building will be four times as large as the pavilion that state erected at St. Louis.

It has been decided that the machinery, as well as the amusements on the "Trail," will be stopped on Sunday. The exhibit palaces will be open to the public and all other features of the Exposition will be running as on week days.

Fraternal societies of the United States have organized for the purpose of erecting a Temple of Fraternity at the Exposition. Over \$20,000 has been pledged toward the project, and the erection of a beautiful and appropriate structure is assured.

The Exposition buildings will be protected from danger of fire by a regular automatic system of fire alarms. The system works like ordinary improved city systems, automatically harnessing the horses to the fire engines and wagons, as well as sounding the alarm.

Western school teachers have adopted a novel method of advertising the Exposition. They give their children as an exercise the task of writing a letter to some relative or friend in the East, extending an invitation to attend the fair. School children of Moscow, Idaho, recently wrote 1100 such letters.

Ground has been broken for the Washington state building and work on the structure begun. The building will typify the timber wealth of the Evergreen state. The Washington legislature recently appropriated \$75,000 for erecting the building and collecting and installing a comprehensive display of the resources of the state.

An excursion that will doubtless attract great interest is one planned by F. R. Drew of New York City. Mr. Drew will conduct a train of prairie schooners from Portland, Maine, to Portland, Oregon, the latter part of the journey being along the trail followed by Lewis and Clark a century ago. The travelers expect to reach Portland in October, in time to attend the Exposition.

Germans all over the Pacific Northwest are planning to attend the greatest saengerfest ever held by the North-Pacific Saengerbund at the Exposition on July 21-23 next. During these three days the sons of the fatherland will own the fair and the fair city, and a great celebration is promised. A local committee, headed by Paul Wessinger, is making arrangements for the saengerfest, and the committee's efforts will be centered on German Day, July 22.

While some three thousand men seek to be guards at the Exposition, and many have excellent recommendations, only one man of the whole three thousand has been definitely promised the position. That man is "Cherokee Bill," and he bears a recommendation from the President of the United States. "Cherokee Bill," otherwise Private E. S. Kinkead, was one of "Teddy" Roosevelt's rough riders, and was a friend of President Roosevelt when the latter was a plainsman.

A great conference of cities, which will be addressed by leaders in the movement for municipal reform, will be one of the most important features of Sunday exercises at the Exposition. The cities of the Pacific Northwest, the great territory which was won for the United States by the expedition of Lewis and Clark, will be asked to send dele-

gates to the great civic conference, which will be held during the latter part of August. Dr. Edgar P. Hill of Portland is now in the east arranging for distinguished speakers on subjects connected with municipal reform who will address the gathering.

With almost four months remaining before the opening of the Lewis and Clark Exposition June 1, the demand for exhibit space by manufacturers and foreign governments has been so great that not only is every square foot of the original provision contracted for, but much additional space as well. Aside from the new emergency building now going up, it has been found necessary to add to the space in the Palace of Machinery, Electricity and Transportation, by adding two wings, one at each end, each wing to be 100x100 feet. The building as it now stands is 100 feet wide by 500 feet long.

The exhibit of the Department of State, which will be incorporated with that of the President's office, will form one of the most interesting displays in the Government's elaborate exhibit. The exhibit is designed to present the history of the establishment of the Government of the United States, a history of the State Department, and a portrayal of its functions, with present methods of administration. It will include all papers in the department's archives having any bearing whatever on the Lewis and Clark Expedition. A facsimile of the Declaration of Independence will be shown, with portraits of its fifty-six signers, as well as a facsimile of the Articles of Confederation, and a reproduction of the original draft of the Constitution of the United States. Portraits of all the signers of these great papers will be displayed.
