Local Events.

Wm. Giles is putting up a creditable residence on his place southeast of Newberg.

Special services begin at the Brethren church Sunday, Elder G. H. Graybill of Nampa, Idaho, being in charge.

Cap. H. H. Herrick, who recently purchased Wm. Giles' property on South River street, is putting up a seven room cottage.

The sacred concert for which the choir of the Friends church has been practicing for some weeks will be given Friday evening, March 24th.

Miss Chase of New Hampshire, will speak for the Civic club at Crater's hall Monday evening, March 20, at 8 o'clock. You are invited to attend.

The college boys have begun training for track athletics under the direction of Roy Heater as coach. There is prospect of a good team this season.

The sawmill's supply of logs is about exhausted and the company is anxiously awaiting a few hours rain which would bring more saw timber down the Willamette.

The Amity Advance has gotten out a handsome eighteen page Lewis and Clark edition which is a credit to the county. It treats the resources of its section comprehensively and is generously illustrated.

E. A. Soper has sold his Chehalem mountain farm of four hundred and fifty acres to Porter Skinner of Springbrook and the latter's son-in-law, Mr. Dooley, of Portland, the consideration being nine thousand dollars. It is understood that Mr. Skinner will take personal charge of the place. Mr. Soper announces it as his intention to move to San Diego, California.

Miss Reva Morelock of Progress is visiting in town with Miss Amy Heater.

Dr. H. B. Clough took Mrs. Clough to Portland Monday where she was operated on for appendicitis.

The long-continued fair weather breaks a record of twenty or twenty-five years in the history of Oregon climatic conditions. It was announced the first of the week that the Willamette river was within a foot and a half of the low water mark, and there is less snow in the mountains than has been known for years at this season. Fruit trees are coming into bloom a month or more ahead of schedule. "What will the harvest be?" is the popular refrain.

At a special meeting of the council held last night the matter of improving First street as announced was the leading subject of consideration. A good audience of property holders was present and a good deal of plain talking pro and con was heard. The objectors held that the proposed improvement is out of proportion to the size of the town, while the advocates of the plan maintained that it would do more than all else to attract outside capital and bring an unprecedented era of development. Council continued action until next Thursday evening, when another special session will be held. The grade to be established came in for full discussion. The council voted to raise the grade already established, eight inches at College street, the Parker Mercantile corner, and six inches at Washington street, the Porter & Larkin corner. A good deal of objection was raised to staking cows on the street. The council decided that if such could not

be prohibited by the present ordinance, a new one should be drawn. An ordinance was passed dividing the Fire Department into two companies, the hook and ladder company to have an enrollment of 12 to 20, and the hose company from 16 to 30. The latter company is to be divided into two divisions, there being a plan on foot to have a hose cart stationed at each end of town.

One yoke strap gave way and resulted in the loss of a four hundred dollar team to Dr. H. A. Littlefield. The doctor, accompanied by T. H. Bryan, was on his way across the river Sunday morning, and on arriving at the ferry he jumped from the rig, giving the lines to Tom, who started down the steep hill to the river's edge. The strap broke and precipitated the trouble. The driver tried to pull the horses into the bank, but was pitched out of the buggy, and before he could regain his feet the horses had gone into the Willamette and soon drowned. The outfit was hauled out later, and the buggy and harness recovered. A medicine case was lost, while some valuable instruments, just purchased, were attached to a large bottle and thus saved from sinking.

The purposes and objects of the Civic Club recently organized in Newberg, are explained in a letter to the Graphic by a member. It is impossible this week to give space to the communication complete, but here is the gist of it: "While the prime object of this organization is for equal suffrage, there are many other interests that the members of this club are discussing. Newberg has no public library, no reading room, no city park, no street sprinkler, and several other things are lacking that would add materially to the city's prosperity. These women are too busy to become members of a society that does not do things, so we expect to do things and to do great things, and hope for the co-operation of the good men of the town." All this sounds business-like. We are ready to be shown.

On Saturday, March 11, in the still watch of the night, the death angel took from our midst one of the sweetest of human flowers, Mrs. Bessie R. C. Carter. She was born in Norrie, Wisconsin, in 1882. At the age of eleven, with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Chase, she moved to Chehalem Center. During the first revival held there, Bessie, when only fourteen years old, was converted and joined the Friends church. Her daily life told of the sincere consecration she made at that time. On December 31, 1902, she was united in marriage to Mr. Ray Carter. They lived in Washington a short time, but returned to Newberg last December. She was an earnest Christian, always thoughtful of others, a loving daughter and sister and a faithful wife. While she was taken away in the very bloom of life, she has entered into the rest prepared for those who serve the Heavenly King. A large circle of relatives and friends mourn her loss. The funeral services, conducted by Rev. H. T. Cash, assisted by Rev. Gould, were held in the Friends church Sunday afternoon and were largely attended.
