"There's a work for each of us now to do." Join the Board of Trade and help the good work along.

The agitation for better train service in this section of the country is more general and more united than ever before. With determination and perseverance, now is the time to accomplish something.

Who was afraid it wouldn't rain? We don't have the violent extremes here which menace life and the pursuit of happiness in Southern California. The showers of blessing come with gratifying moderation—and they never fail.

"Not on your life," is the sturdy reply of Sheriff Tom Word to those who are laboring to get him to let up his strenuous campaign in the North End until after the fair. "They tell me my policy will hurt the fair, but it isn't going to hurt the fair half so much as an open town would hurt the city," says the sheriff. Bully for Tom Word. He's a stayer.

Do we realize that the Lewis and Clark Centennial looms up before us at a distance of but little over two months? We have been talking so long of the 1905 fair, which was always away in the future, that it is hard to bring it down to the present tense. But it's about time. There are so many things to do in preparation and it's time they were being done. It won't do to put them off much longer. We've been doing lots of talking—let's do a little work.

According to Tuesday evening's Portland papers the Oregon Development League convention has been called off by Secretary Richardson for the reason that the railroads wouldn't give a one fare rate. Mr. Richardson did just right in refusing to be held up. The railroad officials of this state will have to be shown a few things by the people and now is a good time to begin. In the face of such a show-down the affected zeal of the transportation companies for the development of Oregon is seen to be sadly warped.

The Junction City Times notices a large number of "public spirited" citizens who are very liberal with their advice and expression of their ideas, and exceedingly anxious to see their neighbors subscribe liberally to any and all enterprises to help the town and country, but seldom if ever donate a dollar themselves to anything to assist in such improvements. Just as long as the other fellow does all the putting up or advancement of money, they stand back and enjoy the benefits derived therefrom and at least in heart and thought say: "That's good! Go to it boys!"

There will be noticed in the report of the Board of Trade meeting, a committee is to be appointed to solicit every man in the community to become a member of the Newberg Board of Trade. There is an immense amount of work to be done for the development of this section

of country this summer. Exhibits must be secured for the fair, a lot of advertising matter must be gotten out, a persistent campaign of agitation must be waged. These things must be done if we succeed. It is not just that the work and expense should fall upon a corporal's guard. Every man in the town and vicinity should be willing to help to the extent of one dollar, the membership fee. Newberg expects every man to do his duty.

The idea advanced relative to forming auxiliary state organizations here is a good one and certainly worthy of consideration. In Portland there have been organized Iowa, Missouri, Indiana, Illinois, Dixie and various state societies, the object of which aside from pleasant social intercourse, is to advertise the fair in the respective states and to co-operate for extending hospitality to visitors from the old home state. Some of the valley towns have taken the matter up and are forming similar societies. Why not Newberg? For instance, the Graphic would like to see a Hoosier society organized along lines suggested. A reunion and picnic with Hoosier visitors this summer would most certainly be looked forward to with great anticipation. Does the idea take? It so, speak up and let the ball be started rolling.

Lewis and Clark Centennial Notes.

Work has begun on New York's \$15,000 state pavilion.

June 14th will be the Daughters of the Revolution and American Flag Day.

The convention of the National Woman's Suffrage Association will be held this year at the Exposition, the sessions being from June 29 to July 5.

The exhibit from the state of Wyoming will show the wonderful results obtained by irrigation in the task of redeeming the arid lands of the west.

President Roosevelt has heartily approved the plans for a conference on the relation of the United States to the Orient, which is to be held next summer at the Exposition.

The Fire Department at the Exposition is now practicing daily, and makes tests of water pressure. The department has a fully equipped station and is able to cope with any blaze.

Several hundred Burlington, (Ia.) people are planning to visit the Exposition in July, in order to be present at the session of the American Librarians' annual meeting, which is held in Portland from July 2 to 7.

Hundreds of carloads of exhibits have already arrived and more come every day. The cars are brought into the grounds by way of a spur and are unloaded, the contents being stored in the finished exhibits palaces.

The Union Pacific railroad is soon to issue an attractive folder regarding the Exposition, which will be distributed widely throughout the east and middle west. Several other roads have issued, or will issue, similar pamphlets.

A congressional party of ten senators and fifteen representatives will visit the Lewis and Clark Exposition and take part in the ceremonies on the opening day, June 1. The expenses of the trip are provided for by an appropriation of \$10,000.

Ornate staff work now in process on the Bridge of Nations will give the structure the appearance of an arched stone bridge of the most beautiful design. The bridge is over 2000 feet long, connecting the mainland to the Government Peninsula.

Several concessions have been let at the Centennial which require considerably more space than the original plans for the "Trail" would permit. The Amusement Street will have to

be enlarged so as to provide several thousand square feet of additional space.

August 1 has been decided upon as Kentucky day. August 1 was the birthday of Captain William Clark, who shared with Captain Merriweather Lewis the dangers and privations of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Captain Clark was for twenty years a resident of Kentucky.

The railroad companies have extended the time limit for the shipping of exhibits from St. Louis to Portland until the latter part of March. This will serve materially to better the appearance of the exhibits for the Lewis and Clark Exposition, as it will afford exhibitors more time in which to assemble and pack them.

Utah will spend \$30,000 on her display at the Exposition, and this sum will enable the state to be represented in a most creditable manner. The more desirable exhibits from St. Louis will be shipped to Portland for display at the Coast Fair, and with the new displays for which the appropriation provides, an excellent showing is assured. The state will erect a pavilion for the housing of its exhibits and for the reception of visitors.

Coos county, which announced some time ago that it would erect a separate pavilion at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, has made good the announcement by selecting a site for the structure. The pavilion, which will cost about \$10,000, will stand a short distance from the Colonnade Entrance a little to the west of the Administration Building. Coos county timber resources

will be exploited in a most practical way in the construction of the building, which will be finished in natural woods inside and out.
