The Woodman band boys cleared thirty-five dollars with their box supper social Saturday night, which, with what they already had, netted them just about enough to secure the much desired suits.

Jesse Edwards is making a business tour of various Puget Sound towns this week. In his absence Mrs. Edwards has been visiting her son, Walter and family, in Portland and attending the Chapman meetings.

This is conceded to be one of the choice business locations in Newberg and the purchasers hope to organize a company to erect thereon a good brick building.

This manifests a commendable spirit of interest and co-operation on the part of a non resident property holder.

In the afternoon when all visiting Woodmen visited the Lewis and Clark fair grounds, the Newberg band was on hand and has the distinction of being the first band to occupy the Exposition music stand facing the grand stairway. In the evening the team gave an exhibition drill and won such admiration that prominent Portland Woodmen talk of raising a fund to send the boys to the Los Angeles convention next month.

At the special council meeting last Thursday night a resolution was adopted calling for the improvement of First street, between Center and Main, as first proposed, and notices ordered posted accordingly. This means the grading of the street according to the established grade, the placing of a coat of nine inches of gravel in the center of the street and six inches on the grade to curb, and the putting in of cement curb, gutter and cement crossings. The estimated cost will be about two dollars per foot on each side the street. Various other streets will also be graded and repaired.
