The meeting of the Oregon Development league, which was postponed, will be held in Portland, April 26th and 27th, the officers and the railroad officials having come to an understanding as to transportation rates.

The victory of the saloon people of Forest Grove at the last election proves an empty one as Judge McBride has ruled that under the present charter of that town, intoxicants cannot be sold. Good! This fixes the fellow who was ready to open a saloon within three hundred feet of the Pacific University campus.

In these days of multiplied petitions and counter petitions, it is generally worth one's while to give the paper a little scrutiny before affixing your signature with a careless flourish. You owe it to yourself and to others. In the rush of business, men do not take time to see to what proposition they are lending their influence. We look at the boy who drops his eyes before the gaze of others, who seeks questionable companionship, who sneaks around the corner and sucks a cigarette and who swears with gusto, and we see before us the boozier, the gambler, the trifling ne'er do well, the criminal. From present indications, parents, in which class can you reasonably expect to find your boys twenty years hence? Where will be found the boys of Newberg? In the girl who is ladylike, courteous, and who helps her mother, we see the good spirit of a future home. In the girl who runs the streets at all hours, and often in very questionable company, who is brazen and holdenish, we see the future gadabout, silly tattler, and fallen woman. Parents will do well to question themselves seriously as for which class they are training their daughters. Boys and girls are preparing for both classes in Newberg. What will your children be twenty years from now?

Lewis and Clark Centennial Notes.

Captive balloons, airships and an aerodrome will prove very interesting features of the Exposition. A number of flying contests are being arranged.

Hon. Carlos Coffigny, secretary of state of Cuba and a number of his distinguished countrymen have announced their intention of visiting the fair.

A feature of the Government Fisheries exhibit will be a miniature reproduction of the Columbia river, illustrating the various methods of catching and spawning salmon.

Mrs. Eliza Warren, the oldest living white child who was with the famous Marcus Whitman

expedition and a survivor of the Whitman massacre, will visit the Exposition.

Designs for the new passes, stockholders' tickets and commutation tickets for the Exposition have been received by the director of admissions. The drawings are elaborate and depict scenes closely associated with the history of the great Northwest.

Two hundred Igorottes, Moros, Negritos and Visayans will leave the Philippine Islands this week, arriving in Portland the latter part of April, where they will proceed immediately to the grounds of the Exposition. Upon their arrival, the construction of the Philippine village will be started at once. A feature of this will be a city of houses built on poles over the surface of Guild's Lake. This is characteristic of the expedient resorted to by the natives to avoid reptiles and foes of smaller kind. The city of pole-houses will be occupied by the Moros, who with the Igorottes stand lower in the scale of civilization. Boiled dog will represent the principal sustenance of the Igorottes, who are conceded to be epicureans regarding this delicacy.

The most complete exhibit ever made of the works of Edgar S. Paxson, the famous Montana artist, will be made at the fair. Mr. Paxson's compositions attracted considerable attention at the St. Louis World's Fair, but this exhibit at the Western Centennial will be augmented with a number of his greatest works, not heretofore placed on exhibition. The most noted one is the famous Custer picture which proved the feature of his exhibit at St. Louis. Of especial historical significance is Mr. Paxson's study entitled "1804," showing the intrepid explorers, Lewis and Clark, at the head of Lemhi creek, the first water they encountered flowing toward the Pacific.

An Albino Deer.

An albino deer is a rare, very rare, freak of Nature. Nevertheless, a pure albino, with a coat as white as the drifting snow, and eyes a delicate pink, was killed not long ago in the pine-clad mountains of Southern Oregon. It is one of the very few albino deer ever seen in the mountains of the West. Old hunters tell of seeing them, usually separate from the main herds, and at various times during the early days; but they were always too shy and discreet to be approached near enough for a shot.

This deer was killed on Canyon Creek, near West Fort, by G. W. Donnell, a Grants Pass, Oregon, sportsman. It was with four other deer when first

seen, and was at first taken for a young calf. Its white coat made it a conspicuous mark, and it is probably for this reason that albino deer are usually shunned by the main herds.

Like the albino of the human family, the albino deer is purely a freak of nature. Aside from its white coat and pink eyes, it is like all other deer. Its fur seems softer and more silky, but this may be due to the natural inclination the beholder has to rub the white coat—From The Pacific Monthly for April.
