on Health and Police. An ordi-

dent. Bills against the city to
the amount of \$267.44 were
allowed.

J. D. Gordon, who purchased
the Fullquarts place south of
Dundee, and who is president of
the First National Bank of New-
berg, had a couple of fine horses
in town last week which he
brought, with some other well
bred animals, from his former
ranch at Walhalla, North Dak-
ota. One, Roderick II, is a fine
Percheron of excellent pedigree,
while the other, "Better Luck,"
is a beautiful Clydesdale animal
imported from Scotland. The
arrival of such well bred animals
will do much toward raising the
standard of horses in this sec-
tion.

The new sash and door fac-
tory and planing mill at Mc-
Minnville, owned by the Spauld-
ing Logging Company of this
place and by Mr. Adams of Mc-
Minnville, burned down at an
early hour Monday morning.
B. C. Miles went at once to the
county seat to view the remains
and found everything destroyed
beyond repair unless it be the
boilers. The factory had been
running but a few weeks, and a
fine lot of materials which had
been turned out ready for mar-
ket went up in flames. Insur-
ance had not yet been taken out
on the new plant and the loss is
in the neighborhood of five
thousand dollars. The loss of
the machinery, which belonged
to Mr. Adams, is said to leave
him penniless, but the McMinn-
ville people evince intention to
make good his loss that the
plant may be replaced. Incendi-
ary origin of the fire is suspect-
ed as no other satisfactory
theory can be imagined.
