As will be seen by the mayor's announcement in this issue, next week has been set apart as a week for a spring clean up.

He says the town of Newberg has not been overrated and that among its population is a crowd of hustlers who will see that it sustains the reputation for being the liveliest town in Yamhill county. Nevertheless Mr. Walling was surprised to note the substantial progress recently inaugurated here.—Amity Advance.

Mrs. F. A. Elliott, Mrs. G. W. Cutts, Mrs. E. L. Evans and Jesse Edwards drove up to McMinnville Saturday to attend the meeting of the County Board of Exhibit. The ladies assisted in organizing a county ladies' auxiliary to the Board of which Mrs. D. H. Turner and Mrs. J. C. Cooper, both of McMinnville, are president and secretary respectively. Each auxiliary in the county is to have a vice president. A committee was appointed to take the matter in hand of securing a Yamhill county day at the fair and of preparing a county badge. While in McMinnville the Newberg ladies reserved exhibit space for this place on the Newberg pressed brick pillars which are to figure prominently in the arrangement of the Yamhill county exhibit.

At the public school meeting held last Monday the school board was directed to issue bonds to the amount of \$10,000 for the purpose of rebuilding the schoolhouse. The opinion of many is that it would be much more satisfactory in the end to

dispose of the old building and build new from the ground up. A. Bowman says he will donate \$50 above his part of the taxes if such a plan is carried out and J. L. Hoskins says he will willingly pay double his part of the taxes in order to get a new building that will be a credit to Newberg. The first bond of \$2000 will be due in 1908 and the others follow, \$2000 each, payable yearly thereafter.

Alden Chamberlin had a narrow escape at the sawmill yesterday afternoon. His clothes became caught in a shaft and were torn from his body, though the machinery was stopped in time to save him. As it was he received some pretty severe bruises.

M. J. Jones, A. Bowman and C. J. Edwards were bidders on the contract for grading First street and A. H. Douglas was a bidder on the cement work. No contract has yet been let as Mr. Bowman's bid was by the yard and some estimates will have to be made in order to compare the cost with the other bidders, but it has been given out that the cost of grading and graveling the street, and the cement curbing will be less than \$1.75 per front foot for property owners on each side of the street.
