Littlefield, one of the most popular physicians in the county, is comparatively recent and is now followed by that of Dr. Davidson. One is forcibly reminded of the verse of scripture referring to the Master Physician which says, "He saved others; Himself he could not save."

Prof. J. R. McKillop, son-in-law of J. F. Taylor, who has been serving this year as assistant principal of the Ashland High School has resigned his position and has accepted a government appointment to the schools in the Philippine Islands, at a salary of \$1200 a year and expenses. At these figures it is estimated that the cost of the proposed improvement per front foot on each side of the street, will be in the neighborhood of \$1.60, which is considerably lower than the first estimates made.

Street commissioner Wm. Clemmens calls attention of property owners to the fact that assessments for street grading done recently should be paid at the Recorder's office. He serves further notice that dog tax must be paid within ten days to the Recorder or double tax will be collected.

Contractor Robinson who put in the new reservoir for the city last season, came up last night to view the "remains." His attitude is not at all satisfactory to the water committee as he seems to want to patch up the job. If the contract is worth anything the bondsmen should be made to come to time immediately.

The Spaulding Logging Company has just made an important deal in which, for an aggregate consideration of \$200,000, it comes into possession of the plant and interests of the Capital Lumbering Company of Salem. Included in the sale is the sawmill, with a capacity of 50,000 feet per day, and 4000 acres of timber land on the Luckiamute river, in Polk county. The Newberg company is already assuming charge, and expects to operate the mill the year round. Spencer Hunt, one of the bookkeepers in the home office here leaves for Salem today to take the position there as head bookkeeper.

At their meeting Saturday afternoon the ladies appointed Mrs. N. C. Maris, Mrs. L. M. Parker and Mrs. R. J. Cooper as a committee to co-operate with the Board of Trade in getting Newberg cleaned up.
