The advisability of the Council and business men uniting in employing a night watch is now being discussed. Much unnecessary loss would thereby be averted and the hiring of such an officer would seem to be a good business policy.

A Eugene paper says, "A brief review of the situation leading up to a series of spasms on the part of our contemporary that has been bellowing like a motherless calf for the past few days, may not be amiss this time," from which it may be inferred that the "Oregon style" is not yet altogether out of vogue.

After both big hose were trained on the fire for an hour or more Saturday morning, C. S. Calkins telephoned down in response to an inquiry by Councilman J. F. Taylor that the water in the reservoir had been lowered but twelve inches. With the new reservoir in good order it looks like Newberg should have plenty of water.

The Southern Pacific officials say they will furnish the transportation necessary to carry the people to and from the Fair and indicate that they are willing to fix the schedule to suit the convenience of the majority. In order to give us a full day at the fair grounds it will be necessary to leave Newberg at an early hour and return late in the evening. Our people should take the matter up and let the railroad officials know what they want.

Mayor Williams was renominated at the primary election last Saturday in the face of strong opposition, but opposition that was poorly organized. It is very evident that a majority of the people of Portland are not at all satisfied with his administration, but they will have to get together in better shape on election day, if they defeat him. The appellation of "gratd old man," when applied to one who can and does command the support of all the saloon and boodle elements of Portland seems very much out of place to the decent element but it is votes that count on election day and if the opposition to Williams is divided, it cannot hope to win.

Every loss has its lesson, and since the destructive fire of Saturday morning the need of an ordinance establishing a fire limit, which the Graphic has strongly advocated, has been freely commented upon. With the best of protection in the way of good water supply and an efficient fire department, a row of wooden buildings is bound to be more or less of a fire trap. What would have been the result had the building on the west of the Bristow building been also of wood instead of brick, especially if there had been any wind? It was a brick structure that warded off the flames on the west and had there been a breeze stirring, nothing but a brick building would have checked their progress eastward. There are already too many wooden buildings on First street, not only from the standpoint of risk of fire, but from that of the best interests of the town as regards its development and progress. And such buildings will continue to go up until an official veto is registered.

Drop Public Executions.

Anent the execution at Salem Friday of the young Italian murder, the Capital Journal makes the following very sensible remarks:

"This paper entered a protest against making too public the execution of condemned prisoners at the state prison.

It suggested that only enough persons be admitted to prove the death penalty was administered.

It made the suggestion that the exact time when the person was hung be not made public.

Of course, it will take years to get such a reform established. But is it not a crime against humanity to give the widespread publicity that is now given?

Does it not arouse a morbid interest in the execution, and cause the victim himself to hold the thought that he must prepare to act his part as in a tragedy?

There is to be another execution in a few days. Would it not be better to set a wise example in Oregon of the least publicity possible?

Spreading the harrowing details in all the news papers certainly is productive of no good result.

It answers no good purpose. It hardens the public conscience and brutalizes and debauches public sentiment quite as much as public hanging."
