Vice President Fairbanks will represent Uncle Sam at the Lewis and Clark Centennial. This is satisfactory to the Hoosiers of Oregon.

The Oregonian is going after the Portland city council for allowing so many saloons near the entrance to the fair. The situation must be even worse than we had been led to believe.

The State Supreme Court has knocked out the Portland pool-rooms and sustained the lower court by declaring the gambling resorts are public nuisances. While pretty well satisfied in our own minds to that effect, it is reassuring to know that it appeals in the same way to judicial minds.

Anent the painting and cleaning up which is being done throughout the towns of the state the Independence Enterprise remarks that the scraping of the moss off the roofs of Oregon houses is no disrespect to the "Old oaken bucket," which, to its credit, hung in the well out of public view.

All Oregon towns of importance will be given days at the Exposition in the fore part of June. Monday, June 5, has been announced as Dallas, Dayton and Newberg day. This date follows pretty closely after opening day when nearly everybody will want to be in attendance, and is rather a poor day in the week, but under the circumstances guess we had better put off the week's washing and hit the trail.

"Hood River" has become a synonym for push, enterprise and "get there." The people of that valley have a good country and they vie with each other in seeing who can tell the most people that it is the only county on the footstool. It is Hood River first and always, and it there's any breath left Oregon as a state may get "favorable mention." That's what's made Hood River. Ashland and Prohibition.

In an extended article in the Ashland Tribune giving a history of the fight of many years' duration which the temperance people of the Southern Oregon city have waged against the saloons, the closing paragraphs, in which the fruits of the final victory are shown, make good prohibition campaign literature. The experience of Newberg tallies with what follows:

"Since the saloons have been banished from Ashland the town has been more prosperous than ever before. Everybody at all familiar with the facts knows that the growth of Ashland during the last two years has never been equalled. More substantial building has been done, both in residence and business blocks than ever before in the same length of time. The people coming to Ashland are of the best class. We all know absolutely that cutting out the saloon has contributed very largely to the material prosperity that we have enjoyed and that the coming to our city of so many desirable people, is the result, in part at least of our reputation abroad as being a town from which the licensed saloon has been banished.

Ashland is a home town, and every citizen knows that the saloon is the inveterate foe of the home. It is a school town, and all know that the licensed saloon is the deadliest enemy of the schools. Parents who have children to send to school prefer to have them kept away from the bad influence of the saloon. The saloon is the enemy of the churches also, and since, as an institution it has been abolished, the good influences of the Sunday schools and churches on the young men and boys have been greatly enhanced. The virtue loving people of beautiful Ashland are determined to stand together in solid phalanx against this foe of the school, the church, and the home."

Lewis and Clark Centennial Notes.

Twelve notable organ recitals are scheduled for the Exposition. The recitals will be held in the Auditorium, where a \$10,000 pipe organ will be set up.

H. G. Higinbotham, who was director general of the Chicago World's Fair, has accepted the invitation extended by the management to attend the opening exercises on June 1.

John Hunt, one of Oregon's oldest pioneers, has built a miniature corn crib, to represent the kind of crib used by the Oregon farmers in the old territorial days, which he will exhibit.

Joseph Marvin, Alaskan commissioner for the United States Government at the Centennial, is in receipt of a telegram from Governor Brady of Alaska telling him that a large exhibit of gold nuggets has been collected for exhibition. Mr. Marvin has secured a special safe for storing the nuggets.

Roy Knabenshue, who gained renown as the aeronaut who made the only successful airship flight at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, is working on an airship of his own design, which he claims will be superior to the famous "California Arrow," and which he will operate in the airship contests at the Exposition.

An interesting exhibit in the Mines and Metallurgy building is now in course of construction. A miniature mountain is being constructed for the purpose of showing methods of coal mining in Washington. The mine will be tunnelled, and a miniature car will run around the mountain and through the tunnels. The mountain is thirty feet long by twenty wide and is fifteen high.

The log cabin in which President Roosevelt lived for three years while he was a rancher has been placed in the Agriculture building as a part of the state of North Dakota's exhibit.
