



Newberg Sets the Pace For Special Days at the Fair.

Two weeks ago when the official announcement was made that Newberg, Dayton and Dallas had been put down at the head of the list for special days at the fair, considerable discontent was expressed on account of the early date, as it was regarded as unfavorable, coming so early after the opening but it was thought best to accept the date and make the most of it. Newberg took the matter up, committees were appointed and the ball set to rolling.

The S. P. was asked for a special train from Newberg to leave at seven o'clock in the morning, but the committee was assured that everybody would be well taken care of and put into Portland on time. Agent Darling asked for at least three special coaches and two hundred tickets but the officials, including the conductors, laughed at him and said they thought Newberg might furnish fifty or seventy-five passengers if the day was favorable.

Well, Monday, June 5th came and the early morning hours were about as unfavorable from the weather man's point of view as could be, as the clouds hung low with a heavy mist falling, but Newberg had the special day at heart and nothing like an ordinary "mist" was to prevent them from "showing" the railroad people. Those first to arrive at the station loaded into the two coaches left on the side track, while later comers crowded the little ticket office and out on the platform in the grand rush for the necessary pasteboard, but soon the information was passed out that the supply of tickets was exhausted. Then the passengers began to collect into groups of ten to buy "single party" tickets in order to get the half fare rate. The tickets required much writing and Agent Darling, while he kept a clear head, sweat like a July harvest hand. When the train arrived, a little late, instead of fifty passengers, just about three hundred people made up the Newberg contingent.

Traveling passenger agent John P. Jones was on board to assist Conductor Crocker, and beginning at the rear end of the train he commenced to take up tickets. All went well for the first half dozen passengers, then he struck a man who had a single ticket for twenty-five people who were scattered throughout the train and John P. took a hike for the other end of the train and failed to show up any more.

Dallas furnished nearly a hundred passengers, Dayton about the same number and other points swelled the total until the capacity of eight coaches was taxed, and two engines were required to pull the train over the mountain. Everybody, including the puncher of tickets, the genial Jo Crocker, was out for a good time and they had it.

At the fair grounds on the wide, open court fronting the Oregon building President Goode and Jefferson Myers made the addresses of welcome, Mayor Edwards of Newberg presiding. R. L. Harris spoke for Dayton, Mayor Biddle for Dallas and Mayor Edwards for Newberg, the administration band furnishing the music. It was not well understood that these exercises were to be held immediately after arriving at the grounds and the attendance was not as large as it otherwise would have been.

During the day Newberg badges were much in evidence

throughout the buildings and grounds and our people have reason to feel well satisfied with the impression made. Favorable comment was made by the evening papers.

Pickett-Butler Wedding.

A very pretty wedding was solemnized at noon on Thursday, June first, at Dallas at the home of Judge and Mrs. N. L. Butler when their daughter, Persephone Pearl, became the bride of Milton Oscar Pickett of this place, Rev. James Moore, pastor of the M. E. church, officiating. Following congratulations came the wedding dinner, after which the happy young couple took the train for Newberg.

Mr. and Mrs. Pickett have begun housekeeping in their own home, the former having just completed a pretty cottage on Sheridan street south of the Baptist church. The groom is well known as a capable and successful young attorney of Newberg and has won as a bride one of Dallas' most accomplished daughters. May their pathway be ever strewn with roses.
