The Republican party of this state should know by this time that it cannot foist on the people any Tom, Dick or Harry.—Woodburn Independent.

It is something of a surprise to find by personal conversation with residents of Portland the large number who never visited the Lewis and Clark fair grounds during the progress of the work and who have not attended the fair at all since it opened. The Graphic ventures the assertion that a larger proportion of the residents of Newberg have been on the grounds and are able to give a stranger information regarding the fair than Portland can show. Portland people say, "Oh we are waiting until everything is complete," which is as much as to say that they must be sure of the worth of their money on the spot. This is not the Seattle spirit, neither is it the right spirit to manifest. If the Lewis and Clark fair was being held in Seattle every man, woman and child in that city would be whooping it up for the fair and be ready and at hand to give the stranger within the gates pointers regarding the special attractions. Every man in Portland ought to post up and be ready to talk fair in particular and Oregon in general every day in the week for the next three and a half months, and do it in no half hearted way either, but just like they meant it. Oregon's opportunity is at hand if the people will wake up and Portland people ought to begin to rub their eyes and get acquainted with the Lewis and Clark fair.
