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The towns of Milton and Freewater in Umatilla county knocked out the saloons at the recent election by a vote of 396 to 106 and the Milton Eagle in commenting on the result says:

"The election Monday illustrates the practical workings of the local option law. The result showed that about one voter in five in the three precincts where the election was held favor saloons; the other three were opposed. Yet under the old regime it would have been impossible to abolish saloons from Freewater. The one man would have dominated the other four. Under the local option law the majority rules and the saloons will have to go. In Freewater itself the vote was a little over two to one in favor of no saloons, yet heretofore the one has absolutely dictated to the two and a fraction as to the moral condition of their environment. In fact, a majority of the city council could. The entering wedge for the destruction of the liquor traffic was forged when the local option bill became a law. And local option was made possible only by the initiative and referendum amendment.

The published statement giving the cost of seeing the Lewis and Clark fair is somewhat misleading. At least some who have not been on the grounds seem to have the impression that one must pay a separate fee to see the different exhibits. You simply pay fifty cents at the entrance to the grounds and you are at liberty to take the day for it and see everything except the "side shows" on the trail and you will get several times the worth of your fifty cents without seeing the Trail. The government exhibit on the island is as good as was shown at Chicago and in any one of the main buildings the "show" is well worth seeing. If you want to spend money on the "side lines" you can do so but the necessity for such expenditure does not exist.

The fellow who shows up at the fair at the eleventh hour

and asserts that he could have brought a larger pumpkin than the fellow who took his, is entitled to little consideration.

Since it is a common thing now for almost any farmer who has a little push to make "two blades of grass grow where one grew before," Burbank, the wizard of the horticultural world, is now striving to set the peg a notch higher by experimenting on a vine which is to produce potatoes below ground and fruit above. What a boon this will be to the farmer boy for it will cut the hoeing down just one half.

It was easy enough for the big telephone company to fix enough of the councilmen to prevent a second franchise being granted in Portland but when it came to a vote of the people it was a different proposition. Manager Stowe of the Automatic company promises relief for the independent companies that desire to have access to business houses in the city.

An automobile line is being established between Salem and Independence and the schedule is for three trips a day. This is simply another movement made toward the solution of the question of rapid transit in Oregon which means that we will get out of the woods one of these days.
