T. A. Randall, editor of "The Clay Worker," published at Indianapolis, came up from Portland Tuesday evening and made a short visit with O. K. Edwards.

Mrs. A. J. Palmer, of Chehalis Center, who has long been a sufferer from tuberculosis, died last Thursday. The funeral services were conducted at the home on the following day by Rev. H. T. Cash, the burial taking place in the Newberg cemetery.

Next Tuesday marks the glorious Fourth and arrangements are being pushed for Newberg's big peace celebration. The election for the Goddess of Peace has not yet warmed up and it is desired that those having a preference express it by voting at either drug store.

Levi Hagey of Dundee, aged seventy-nine years and one of the pioneers of this section, died Sunday evening from paralysis with which he had been stricken a week previous. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Geo. Greer, at the Danlee church on Tuesday at 10:30 o'clock. Music was furnished by Mrs. W. L. Robertson, Miss Sarah Knight and Professors F. K. Jones and E. Partington of Newberg. Interment was made in the Dundee cemetery.

It is a safe guess that no town in the state is better represented in the mail service in Portland than is Newberg. C. N. Terrell, now in the office of the railway mail service, was the pioneer, and was followed by Ervin Scott, J. G. Hadley and E. W. Hall who are engaged in the city delivery. Hanson who are substituting on the city routes while Arthur Hall has taken a place as clerk in the Portland postoffice.

Prof. F. K. Jones has been given a leave of absence from his college work next year and will spend a year in study. He has not decided definitely whether he will remain on the coast and go to Berkeley or whether he will go east. In the latter case he will attend Yale, Columbia or Cornell. For the past eight years he has faithfully "stayed by the stuff" here and certainly merits this opportunity for fitting himself further for his work. He expects to leave Newberg with his family about the first of August. Miss Gertrude Minthorn, who was graduated from

the classical department of the college one year ago, has been secured to assist in the work next year.

Eastern relatives in the persons of Mrs. D. P. Simmons, Mrs. Cochran and Miss Ella Ross are visiting at the home of M. Ross, east of Newberg.

The remains of Elmer Smith, son of Jasper Smith, who lost his life in Alaska by an accident in a mine were brought here for burial, arriving Tuesday evening.

Cards have been received announcing on June 17 the arrival of a daughter, Ione Mary, in the home of Mr. and Mrs. David Williams, Portland. The latter is better known in Newberg as Miss Vestá Townsend.

Mrs. M. Bowerman and her sister, Miss Lizzie Hibbs, attended the fair Wednesday, the former representing the Ladies Auxiliary who sent down something like a hundred pounds of Royal Anne cherries which were given out to visitors. The cherries were tied together by the stems in small clusters with slips of green ribbon on which were printed the word "Newberg."

The professor in the science department at the college next year will be a college mate of Hervey M. Hoskins at Haverford, Prof. Charles W. Davis, a teacher of experience and well recommended, having been elected to the place. Prof. Davis is from "ole Virginy" and previous to going to Haverford graduated from Guilford college, North Carolina.

Meeting of Board of Trade.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade held Monday night the ladies manifested more public spirit than the "men folks," for, although it was a rainy evening a large number of the members of the auxiliary were in attendance—many more in proportion to their membership than showed up on the other side of the house.

The committee having in charge the subscription paper for raising money for the improvement of the road leading to the ferry reported about \$75 subscribed. Instructions were given the committee to raise at least \$100 and push the work.

Jesse Edwards made reference to the fact that the National Good Roads Committee now touring the state would be glad to hold a meeting at some point in Yamhill county provided the necessary encouragement was given. A motion was adopted expressing a desire for such a meeting and Mr. Edwards was instructed to convey the information to the county court and ask that body to arrange for such a meeting, either at McMinnville or Newberg and urge every road supervisor in the county to attend.

D. Snyder, president of the Dayton Board of Trade conveyed the information to the meeting through C. J. Edwards that it was desired by the Dayton people that Newberg act in conjunction with them in making an effort to put a steam or gasoline launch on the river to carry passengers exclusively, leaving Dayton at six o'clock in the morning and connecting with the motor line at Oregon City, making two round trips daily. Passengers would reach Portland by ten o'clock in the morning and it would give an opportunity to remain over night in the city and return home in the morning. A com-

mittee composed of Clarence Butt, C. J. Edwards and F. H. Caldwell was appointed to take the matter up with the Dayton people.

An interesting letter from J. C. Cooper was read, in which he outlined the work being done at the county exhibit at the fair and thanked the ladies for flowers furnished and others for the interest taken in the exhibit. The matter of keeping some one there to represent Newberg was discussed and a committee composed of C. C. Ferguson, J. C. Colcord and N. C. Christensen was appointed to solicit funds to assist in paying some person for this work.



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
