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Osteopathy Here in Newberg.

We are aware that there are some people here who make fun of and scoff at osteopathy, but they are not of an investigating turn of mind. If they would believe their eyes they would cease such business. They can see people on our streets every day who are living examples of what osteopathy is and of what it has done. Taylor of Tenn.: "When a century later historians are sitting the events of this time for the epoch-making discoveries of science and civilization there will be few chapters more important, I think, than that devoted to the reformation in medicine, which will have come about through the acceptance and practice of Dr. Still's system, known as osteopathy."
