(Continued from Page 1.)

the givers. Amos Kenworthy went home and returned with a beautiful mounted owl which he placed on the clerk's desk as his offering. Before the meeting closed thirty dollars was raised as tuition for the first year of the bird's schooling. While the interesting work was in progress the young people present gathered in the gallery, and soon the enlivening strains of the college song, "The Old Gold and Navy Blue" rang out over the audience, giving a very impressive close to the successful session.

The closing business session of the Yearly Meeting was held Saturday evening, when it was decided to begin next year's meeting on Friday, July 6. Returning minutes of visiting members were read—also a complete list of the names of those members from other yearly meetings who had been in attendance. A general expression of heartfelt appreciation of the presence of so many visiting friends was listened to.

Sunday was appropriately referred to as "the last great day of the feast." Services began at eight o'clock by Evangelist Geo. W. Willis of Ohio, who conducted evangelistic tent meetings throughout the session. At ten o'clock Rev. Keats preached a powerful sermon before a large audience in the Friends church, after which subscriptions amounting to over \$800 were taken for carrying on evangelistic work the coming year. At eleven o'clock Willis Hotchkiss occupied the pulpit of the Baptist church, Pres. Tebbetts of the Presbyterian, and Rev. Amos Cook of the M. E. church. The concluding minute was read by President McGrew at the close of the service, which brought to a conclusion one of the most successful gatherings in the history of Oregon Yearly Meeting.
