



New Business for Newberg.

M. R. Weaver, late general agent of Oregon, Washington and Northern Idaho for the United States Installment Realty Company of Minneapolis, Minn., has resigned his position as such and has decided to permanently locate in Newberg and has moved into the house recently made vacant by the N. C. Maris family. It will be remembered that a few weeks ago Mr. Weaver placed some \$20,000 worth of business here in Newberg for his company which he says is only a small part of the business placed by him for that company, having written the past year alone, business to the amount of over a quarter of a million dollars throughout Idaho and the valley towns of Oregon; some of which we understand will receive their loans here in the very near future. He is still very enthusiastic over the plan of the proposition which he has been representing as he has seen so many buildings erected by that company in different sections thus enabling many families to obtain homes that otherwise would likely pay rent all their lives. He is now engaged in organizing a new company, composed of Newberg and Salem business men with headquarters at Newberg, which, according to the plans of the company to branch out in this and other states as fast as they can secure good men in the different territories, bids fair to prove a big thing for Newberg. They intend operating on a straight \$15 monthly payment per thousand and as they will furnish the loans in consecutive order as issued it would seem as though a great many people of Newberg who are now renting either business houses or residences would take advantage of this proposition and see Mr. Weaver and get in on the ground floor and take up these low numbers before he goes out from here to write business in other towns and thus build or buy property of their own. First come, first served on this plan. Mr. Weaver intends to take an active part in securing new business for the new company and starts for other points next week to solicit and get other men to work.

Lewis and Clark Centennial Notes.

Capt. Speedy, the noted high diver, is now giving two daily performances on the Trail. Capt. Speedy dives from a tower 110 feet high into a tank of water only two feet deep. His tower is merely a fragile ladder affair built in the center of the Trail, and his diving acts are free to all.

A Japanese tea house and garden, built on the edge of Guild's Lake, constitutes a new feature. The house is built in the dainty Japanese style, and tea and rice cakes are served on the cosy veranda by cute little maids from Japan. The new establishment is located on Gray's boulevard, at the very outer edge of the Trail.

The Trail is now being covered with a canvas roof for its entire length along that part of it which extends over the lake. This is the main section of the Trail. The roof will afford protection from the sun and make the Trail more popular than ever. This is said to be the biggest canvas roofing job ever undertaken.

If all the free shows inside the grounds—such as moving picture exhibits, stereopticon entertainments and the like, were charged for at the rate of 25 cents a show, the average price for such performances when given out-

side, it would cost the visitor \$2.25 to see them all. There are nine of these shows, and all are absolutely free to exposition visitors. Each show gives several performances daily.

The skill with which the Portland street car lines handle the crowds of visitors to the exposition is a matter of favorable comment from all quarters. Though from 15,000 to 30,000 people ride to the fair every day, there is practically no crowding, and the conductors are winning praise for their uniform courtesy and attention to the passengers. The exposition is only fifteen miles from the business center of Portland.

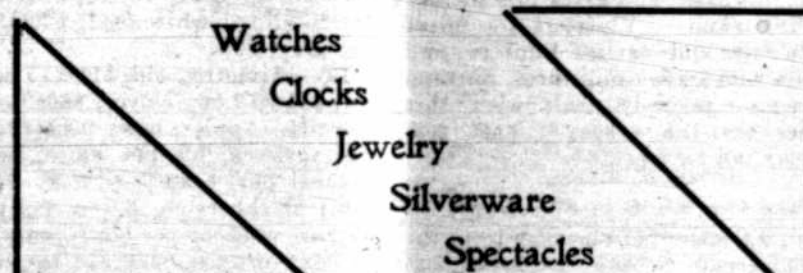
