The county court by a vote of two to one has declined to make an appropriation for maintaining a free ferry across the river below Newberg. Mr. Booth voting for the appropriation and Waddell and Judge Rhodes voting adversely. The Marion county court had already agreed to renew the appropriation for two years more provided the Yamhill county court would do the same, and this offer was made in face of the fact that the only benefit that would come to Marion county would be in the way of accommodating a number of farmers who desire to come over into Yamhill county to do their trading. It is simply a case of broadminded officials on the Marion county side of the Willamette and a couple on the Yamhill side—well it is enough to say that had it been McMinnville that was to receive the benefit from the free ferry the vote would have been different. We hope the Judge and uncle Waddell will at least come down occasionally and "watch us grow".

Independence in politics is the one thing most despised by the party boss. His idea of party politics is that he should be allowed to crack the whip and bring "the boys" who are to cast the votes into line without any sassing back, and it is with grave forebodings that he witnesses a disposition on the part of the people these days to applaud the man in public life who asserts independence of thought and action. Governor Hanly, of Indiana, is a man of this type and the Indianapolis Star says: With the politicians of his party Governor Hanly is in ill repute. But with the masses of the people he is strong. In every part of Indiana you will find that one of the principal reasons why he is respected and trusted is because he is believed to be his own man, standing for his own ideas in open opposition to the machine politicians, who opposed his nomination and will oppose his further political preferment. It is a very healthy sign of the times. You see the manifestations of this same repugnance to bosses and bossism in the popularity of

Theodore Roosevelt, in the successes and wide following of men like LaFollette in Wisconsin and Folk in Missouri. Another such man is District Attorney Jerome in New York City. Another is Governor Deneen in Illinois. These men are popular because they fight their own battles and allow no political go-betweens to intervene between themselves and the people.

Joe Mitchell Chapple attended the Lewis and Clark fair soon after the opening and as noted in the Graphic souvenir edition he found his way to the Yamhill county exhibit. In the August number of the National Magazine, of which he is editor, he devotes a page to the exhibit, a distinction which no other county received at his hands. He makes very favorable mention of J. C. Cooper's book "The Yamhills" as well as Charles Grissen's poem, "The Birth of Oregon," and speaking of the county exhibit says: "Have you ever heard of Yamhill county, Oregon? If you have not you have missed knowing one of the most picturesque and solidly substantial agricultural districts in the great Northwest." My interest in Yamhill increased when I passed into the Agricultural building at Portland and came upon the Yamhill county exhibit and there partook of cherries, rich, ripe, juicy cherries, fresh from the tree. But this county seemed to produce about everything that I could think of, from English walnuts to wheat, barley and all the cereals. Yamhill fruit, however, has already established its reputation. The hospital, intelligent, thrifty people and the homes, schools, and churches of Yamhill are among its most noticeable characteristics, and they are the features which speak well for a city or county, for they look distinctly toward the betterment of the human race.
